**HIGH SCHOOL OPENS
TRAINING COURSE**

A feature of the educational course at the Hood River High School this winter during the present term will be a teachers' training course which will be open to students. The course will extend over a term of nine months and students qualifying will be granted certificates to teach for one year with the privilege of having it renewed for a second year.

A number of students have made application to take the course, but it is necessary to have eight applicants to begin the work. Students in any part of the county are eligible, and any who desire to take the course are requested to communicate with the faculty of the High School.

Funeral services were held Sunday over the body of an infant child of C. E. Rogers of Portland in the Christian church, Rev. T. S. Handsaker officiating. Burial was in Idlewild cemetery.

A big acreage in close-in property changed hands Friday when J. A. Davidson sold 12 acres formerly in the Paradise Farm tract to Mayor Hartwig for \$800 per acre. The property is between the Sherman avenue extension and the Belmont road.

At the First Christian church next Sunday morning Minister T. S. Handsaker will preach on "Intimacy With Jesus." In the evening the discourse will be a popular lecture entitled "Uncle Sam's Golden Call." Miss Todd will sing at the evening meeting.

The revival at Odell is already attracting a great deal of interest. Sunday evening the audience overran the seating capacity of the house. A large tabernacle is being erected south of the E. T. Folts residence, and this will accommodate the entire community.

**MACHINE EXHIBITED
TO CLEAN APPLES**

The demonstration of a fruit cleaning machine at the Davidson Fruit Company Tuesday attracted considerable attention. The machine is for wiping apples and accomplishes the work rapidly and thoroughly. It can be operated by a gasoline engine or electric motor and will wipe 500 boxes of apples a day.

The cost of the apparatus, which is now largely in use at Yakima and other fruit growing centers is \$135.

The work is accomplished without injury to the fruit and is a big saving over hand labor. The apples after being cleaned are rolled out on the packing table by a canvas belt.
