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14 CARS PILE UP AT EAGLE CREEK

Hood River was without direct communication with Portland for 18 hours Thursday, owing to a bad freight wreck.

A broken flange on an extra west bound freight of the O-W. R. & N. caused five cars to plunge through the Eagle Creek bridge, between Bonville and Cascade Locks at 4:20 Thursday morning, and piled nine other freight cars up beside the track. While the equipment of the company was badly smashed, and the freight contents scattered, no lives were lost, nor was any of the crew injured.

When the broken flange permitted a box car to leave the track as the train was going upon the Eagle Creek bridge, two beams of the structure were knocked down. Into this gap five cars plunged before the train stopped, four piled up at the east end and one at the west end. The engine 521, and conductor Zirbel had charge of the train.

ASSOCIATION TO SAVE GRANGE PARK

Seeking to save the west side Grange property as a public park, residents of that locality have formed an association and taken steps to form a corporation for this purpose and are now soliciting subscriptions to carry on the work. The name of the corporation will be the West Side Park Association, and its objects are stated to be to benefit its members and the public generally, and to secure the preservation of the ten acres owned by the Grange for public purposes. It is believed that the association will meet with a hearty response by the city and valley residents interested in the public welfare, and that the required amount will be subscribed.

LARGE PARTY TAKES TRIP TO FISH NETS

Aboard the Olla-S. 100 Hood River citizens went to one of the trap nets being operated in the Columbia river by Ed Wright and E. J. Young Sunday afternoon and witnessed the novel sight of seeing the fish taken from the nets.

The catch was heavy and the big fellows made it lively for the fishermen, who were at times unable to haul the net over the side of the boat until they had partially emptied it by the use of grab hooks.

Afterward the party were taken for a sail up the river a mile or two and return. The day was ideal to be on the river and the large party pronounced the trip a very enjoyable one.

The local fishermen have four trap nets in the river and are now taking big catches.

Live Local Topics

Roger Moe will enter the University of Oregon this fall and will return to Eugene with a number of the Hood River students who have been spending the summer at their homes here.

W. S. Kirk, a postal clerk whose home is at Denison, Texas, was a Hood River visitor Monday. Mr. Kirk was here for a peep at the valley, having heard of the country through shipments of apples sent to Texas.

Adolph Folek and Eva Hillstrom, both of Hood River, were married Monday by Justice of the Peace A. C. Buck. Mr. Folek is the Hood River representative of the Oregon Life Insurance Company and Mrs. Folek is the daughter of J. P. Hillstrom, one of the Middle Valley prominent citizens. The bride and groom will make their home at Hood River.

Death of Geo. P. Crowell

Geo. P. Crowell, one of Hood River's most highly esteemed citizens, and a pioneer resident here of many years standing, died at his home in this city, Tuesday, Sept. 5, after a protracted illness. The cause of Mr. Crowell's death was paralysis.

Mr. Crowell was born at Orange, N. J., in 1839, served through the Civil War in Company D, of the Eighth New Jersey Regiment. After the war he located in Morristown, Tenn.

Development of the Northwestern country had scarcely begun when Mr. Crowell arrived on the Coast. His first few years here were spent on Government surveys. He accompanied E. L. Smith on the survey of the boundary line between Canada and the United States and later in surveys in different parts of Oregon. Mr. Smith, soon after the surveys were made, established one of the first stores in the Hood River valley, and Mr. Crowell was one of the first clerks. He later purchased the store. He retired from the business a number of years ago.

He is survived by his wife whose name was formerly Marybeth English and Miss Carrie Crowell, his sister.

The funeral of Mr. Crowell was held at two o'clock Thursday afternoon from his late residence, services being conducted by Rev. E. A. Harris, of Riverside Congregational Church. The funeral was largely attended, and the burial service was in charge of members of Canby Post, Grand Army of the Republic. Burial was in Idlewild Cemetery.

The following tribute to Mr. Crowell as a citizen and soldier is from the pen of one of his comrades:

The death, recently, of George P. Crowell, a pioneer citizen of Hood River, deserves more than a passing notice. Rev. E. A. Harris, in his eloquent address at the funeral services, depicted the character of deceased in a manner pleasing to old-timers who listened to the address. All who knew Geo. P. Crowell can give testimony to his upright character, his honesty, his Christian forbearance. For years he was the leading merchant of Hood River. During the hard times in Hood River in 1894, when our strawberry crop was left to rot on the vines because of the flood in the Columbia that washed out the railroad, Geo. P. Crowell extended credit to the sufferers, and no one knows how many families were aided over by him during that disastrous year.

Before the advent of banks in Hood River, Crowell's store was the depository for any surplus money the more fortunate of our citizens accumulated. He was our banker, and no man ever lost a dollar through Geo. P. Crowell. While he was our only notary public, no one was ever charged a cent for his legal services. "As honest as George Crowell" got to be a by-word with those who knew him. By honesty, industry and perseverance his life was made successful.

His declining years were spent in one of the most beautiful homes in Hood River. He rounded out his three score years and ten, and more, and was followed to the grave by a concourse of his fellow citizens who sincerely mourned his passing away.

The record of Geo. P. Crowell as a soldier was one to be proud of. It is the wish of the comrades of Canby Post that the following mention of Geo. P. Crowell's bravery at the battle of Williamsburg, Va., be published in our local papers. The chaplain of the 8th New Jersey regiment, in which Crowell served, wrote to his home paper, the Newark Mercury of May 27, 1862, an account of the battle, and gave incidents and honorable mention where found worthy. He wrote:

"Private George P. Crowell of Company D, as our line of battle, during a desperate assault of the enemy, was ordered to be formed anew some eight feet back, found himself between the fire of our regiment and that of the enemy. He had not heard the order to fall back, so intent was he in firing his gun. But when he comprehended his position, he coolly placed his back to a tree, to shelter himself from our fire, and, face to the enemy, exposed to almost certain death, he there maintained his position, constantly firing until the enemy was repulsed and a new line formed by our regiment."

AMBURANT CANBY POST, G. A. R. Mrs. Quackenbush Dies Suddenly

Mrs. Anna C. Quackenbush, wife of Mr. Elmer Quackenbush, who resides just west of the city, died suddenly at her residence Friday morning, September 8th, from a stroke of apoplexy. Mrs. Quackenbush, who was about 71 years of age, came to Hood River with her family several years ago and had resided here during the summer. In addition to her husband, she is survived by her sons. The death of Mrs. Quackenbush was totally unexpected, as she was apparently as well as usual and was in the city shopping Thursday. The body was taken to Portland Saturday, where funeral services were held Sunday.
