

GRAND JUNCTION ANNOUNCES PRICES

The most important news development of the day, according to the Northwestern Exchange, is the announcement of opening prices by the Grand Junction Fruit Growers' Association of Colorado, one of the largest and strongest associations on the western slope of Colorado. This association, for years, has been a very strong factor in the Colorado boxed apple situation; its grade and pack are very favorably regarded by the buying trade throughout the country, and its quotations, therefore, make a very strong effect on the whole market situation, so far as it is influenced by Colorado competition. The prices referred to have been reported to the Exchange as follows:

The 3rd grade of the Grand Junction

association is called "Standards" and will be sold lower than Choice. The above are the principal varieties on which Colorado claims distinction.

The Exchange has a report from one of its salesmen in the field to the effect that he has seen a bona fide quotation from a Washington shipper on Jonathans and Grimes Goldens, fancy grade, \$1.35 f. o. b.

GRANDDALLIES WOMAN HAS TURKEY RANCH

Mrs. Lee Brune, of Granddallies, is raising turkeys on a large scale. She is successful in growing fine stock and is not bothered by coyotes. The Brune ranch of several thousand acres lies on the south side of the Klickitat hills, across from The Dalles, Oregon, and is one of the largest private sheep ranches in Washington. Mrs. Brune has put five miles of woven wire fencing around her turkey range, where grasshoppers are plentiful, and the national bird waxes fat on them. At Thanksgiving time Mrs. Brune markets hundreds of turkeys, on which she makes a fine profit.

COURT DECIDES IN FAVOR OF BINGEN

The people of Bingen have again won in their suit against the Portland, Spokane & Seattle Railroad Company in an action restraining the road from changing the name of the station to White Salmon. This is the third decision in favor of Bingen. According to the Bingen Observer, the suit was brought for the following reasons:

"The main points contended for by Bingen were: That the railroad company's depot was on the town-site of Bingen, and the right of way had been donated to them, it being understood, as a matter of fact, that the depot would be called after the town; that tickets would be sold to Bingen, freight accepted for Bingen, and that Bingen would receive appropriate notice on the time cards and tariff sheets. That the company understood this is shown by the fact that for three months they did so recognize it, and then, without a word of explanation, without consulting the proprietors of the townsite, who gave them the right of way, the company wiped the name of Bingen off their map and substituted the name of a rival town. When the railroad commission were appealed to and rendered their decision, the railroad company objected on the ground that the people of White Salmon had not been heard in the matter.

"The case was appealed to the superior court, and for the third time the decision is the same."

SPOKANE APPLE SHOW PRIZES TOTAL \$20,000

Thirty-nine hundred dollars, of a total of \$20,000 in premiums and trophies, is offered as prizes in carload contests on pack, variety and decorative features at the fourth National Apple Show in Spokane, November 23 to 30. The chief prize, \$500 in gold and the International Apple Shippers' association's trophy cup, is for the best packed car of 630 boxes or 210 barrels of apples grown in one orchard and exhibited by the owner, lessee or agent of the land. Prizes of \$300 to firsts and \$100 to seconds are announced in each of the following carload competitions:

Spitzenburg, Winesap, Jonatan, McIntosh Red, Rome Beauty, Wagner, Yellow Newtown, any standard variety not mentioned in the foregoing and mixed carload of commercial varieties, each variety to consist of not less than 50 boxes.

Quality, color, size, uniformity and pack will be considered by the judges in scoring the exhibits for awards.

A special prize of \$200 will be awarded to the exhibitor of the most artistically decorated carload display.

This arrangement makes possible the winning of \$1000 by a single carload entry, without forcing the grower into competition under a handicap against varieties scoring higher on quality.
