J. N. Teal, the well known Portland attorney, spent Sunday in Hood River as the guest of his sister, Miss Helen Teal. Mrs. Lois Bruce is the guest of Miss Teal this week.

Albert S. Hall, local manager of the Pacific Power & Light Company, returned Saturday from Spokane, where he was in attendance for a week at the annual convention of the Northwestern Light & Power Association. The meeting was the most important in the history of the organization, which has this year become affiliated with the National Electric Light & Power Association.

### CITY COUNCIL HAS VERY BUSY SESSION

The matter of greatest interest at the city council meeting Monday night was expected action on the recommendation to close the skating rink. After discussing the matter and hearing both sides of the controversy a resolution was adopted instructing the judiciary committee to bring in an ordinance declaring the institution a nuisance and abolishing it.

Other business considered by the council was a petition for the improvement of Adams street and one asking for an extension of time to construct sidewalks on State street. A communication was received from the First National bank offering to take the Oak street improvement bonds at par, and the Surety Savings & Trust Company of Portland submitted a bid of par and \$5 premium for the sewer bonds. The offers of L. C. Kelsay to become consulting engineer for the new water plant at 2 1/2 per cent of the contract price, amounting to \$3,000, and of J. F. Newell to serve in a similar capacity for \$25 per day were received and held for further action. Action was also deferred on the proposition of the Skamania Light & Power Company. A remonstrance against constructing sewers in districts 6 and 7 was laid over for a week.

Conner & Son were awarded the contract for sidewalks on the heights at 81 cents per foot and 37 cents for curbs and gutters. E. O. Hall securing the grading. An ordinance providing for the improvement of Cascade avenue west of Fifth street was passed and one for the vacation of Fifth street for a library building laid on the table.

An ordinance granting a franchise to John Koberg to erect poles and wires on the street leading to the ferry landing was referred to the street committee, while a new one was introduced providing for more adequate fire escapes on all hotels, rooming houses and public gathering places. The names of streets were ordered placed on the corners of cement walks and the street committee was ordered to devise some means of removing posts and porches overhanging sidewalks and report at the next meeting.

**How "Abide With Me" Was Written.**  
 At the age of fifty-four Lyte found himself doomed to die of consumption, and in sorrow at having to leave his task unfinished he prayed that at the least it might be granted to him to write something which would live to the glory of God when he was dead. Then on the last evening he ever spent at Brixham, after preaching his farewell sermon, he took pen and as the sun was setting over the ships that lay in the harbor "Abide With Me" was written. Next morning he started for the Riviera and there died a month later.—London Telegraph.

**Don't Send Tax Money to Assessor**  
 Taxpayers are requested not to send money for taxes to the assessor but to send it to the sheriff. Money has been forwarded to the assessor's office under the misapprehension that notices being sent out by the assessor are tax notices. The notices are simply memorandums of the assessment made on properties of the person receiving them. Unless taxes are delinquent they are not payable until after the first of the year.
