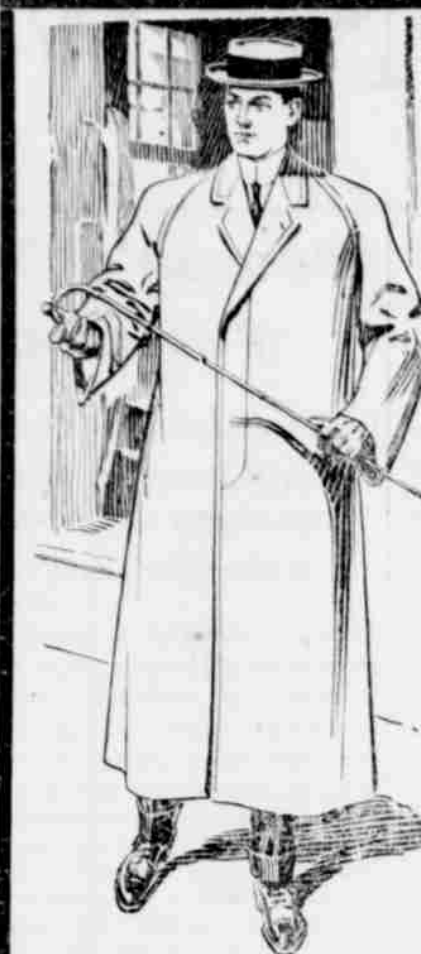

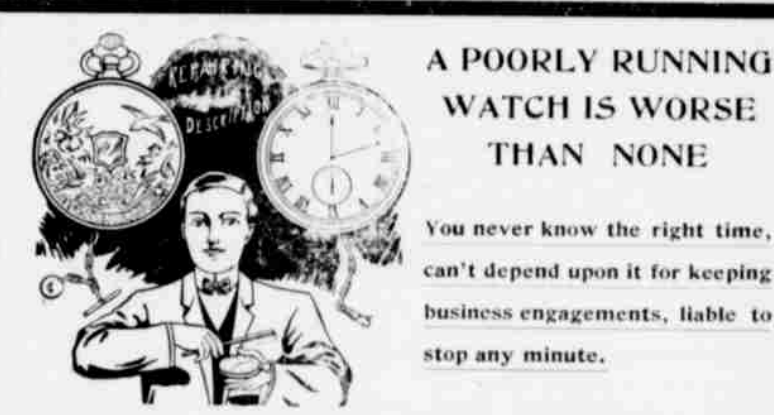
## DIED
