MADE STRONG PLEA AGAINST DIVORCE

The mission lectures at the Catholic church during the week have attracted wide interest and large congregations have been in attendance nightly to hear Rev. Thos. Brady expound the faith of the church and explain the reasons for its many religious forms and ceremonies.

The largest congregation was in attendance Sunday evening when Rev. Father Brady delivered a strong address on the evils of divorce which he states is threatening the church, state and nation and is not countenanced by the Catholic church.

According to Father Brady the increase in the number of divorces in the United States is appalling, there having been no less than 1,000,000 from 1880 to 1900, or one divorce for each nine marriages. More divorces are granted in the United States, said Father Brady, than in any other Christian country in the world, the number being exceeded only in Japan and Algeria, two pagan nations. Divorce, he claimed, was assailing the stability of the United States, the greatest nation on earth, through the home and he urged his hearers to align themselves with a nation wide movement against it.

Father Brady also stated that when Catholics and non-Catholics came to an understanding they could work effectively together for the general good of humanity.

During the services Father Pins thanked the Hood River people for the interest they have shown in the lectures and paid a high tribute to the citizens of both the city and valley. At the close of the services a volume explaining the faith and services of the Catholic church, written by Cardinal Gibbons, was distributed among the congregation. Cardinal Gibbons' work has had an edition of over 1,000,000 copies and is said to have made over 100,000 converts to the Catholic faith.

STREET CAR CAUSES DEATH OF B. R. TUCKER

B. R. Tucker, one of Hood River's oldest pioneer residents, died in San Diego, Calif., Saturday, from injuries received by being struck by a street car. The news of Mr. Tucker's death was first received in Hood River in a dispatch to his son, Charles Tucker, but no details as to the accident were made known.

Immediately on receipt of the news, Mrs. James Frary, Mr. Tucker's daughter, accompanied by her husband, left for San Diego. Mr. Tucker went to Southern California about a year ago, on account of his health, and has since resided there.

The deceased was one of the best known men in the valley. His orchard was considered a model, and for many years he lived at the point where the west side road crosses the Hood river, and in early days operated a saw mill there. The bridge that crosses the river, known as Tucker's bridge, is one of the landmarks of the valley on account of Mr. Tucker's long residence there.

DOMESTIC SCIENTIST CAPTURES AUDIENCE

The domestic science lecture Saturday, given by Mrs. W. H. Lawrence, assisted by Mrs. Kanaga and Miss Horning, at Heilbronner hall, was well attended. The lecture not only demonstrated Mrs. Lawrence's ability in the art of cooking, but also that she knows how to entertain her audience. Garbed in spotless white, she mixed a salad with much grace and ability. Her audience was charmed both by its appearance and toothsome, and also her statement that it cost but thirty cents, although it did not look like that much taboored figure. The subject for Saturday will be cakes.

A number of Pine Grovelites proved their pedestrianism Sunday by walking over to Mosier by the trail that leads over the mountain back of the Coffin place. They returned, however, by train.

Pine Grove teachers and others from this locality attended the Hood River county institute held at Barrett and the dedication of the new school building of that place last Saturday. They report a pleasant and profitable time.

Mrs. Warren Wells and daughters Hattie and Goldie have returned from a visit at the old home in northern Illinois. They were accompanied by Mrs. Wells' brother and nephew. Mrs. Wells says she is glad to get back to Webfoot to get away from the rain, as it rained nearly all the time she was there.

Last Friday afternoon the patrons of the district were invited to attend the raising of the new flag over our school house. Between forty and fifty responded and were delightfully entertained. The exercises opened with a musical program by the school, followed by a drill in the yard very nicely executed by the pupils. The old flag, which has done duty for a number of years and was the pride of the children in its day, was carefully rolled up and the beautiful new flag in all its splendor unfurled and raised over the building, being presented to the district by Miss Dortha Godderson in behalf of the donors. After the raising of the flag the pupils served refreshments to the visitors. This was followed by a round table, many interesting subjects being discussed. All attending had a very pleasant afternoon and feel that a very efficient corps of teachers have hold of the reins this year.

FIRES DAMAGE SHOP AND DESTROY HOME

That fires come in bunches was again demonstrated last week, when a conflagration of unknown origin broke out in the rear of Young's butcher shop Tuesday night and did considerable damage, and another destroyed a dwelling owned by J. W. Rigby, on Sixth street, Wednesday night, entailing a loss of \$1200, covered by but \$500 insurance. Several theories exist as to the origin of the fire. Nurses at the hospital adjoining the burned building, and which was only saved by hard work on the part of the volunteer fire department, state that the blaze was caused by a defective flue or burning chimney, while others say that the fire was caused by the explosion of a gasoline stove used by lodgers on the second floor of the building.

Although the firemen responded promptly, the flames spread so fast that it was impossible to save the burning building, which was gutted. Good service, however, was done in saving the adjoining buildings.

The burned structure has an interesting history, as it was built from the timbers taken from the first Methodist church erected at Hood River, and situated nearby. At that time this location was considered as being very much in the suburbs, and was covered with big oak trees. Attendance at church at night was looked upon as being attended with some danger, and the church goes went in groups for protection.

TREW HIMSELF IN FRONT OF ENGINE

Stepping in front of O-W. R. & N. train No. 1, near The Dalles, C. L. Richards, a tramp about 40 years old, committed self-destruction on Thursday afternoon.

Richards was literally ground to pieces. Eye witnesses to the deed say the man stood to the side of the rails as if he intended to wait for the train to pass, and then coolly stepped on the track immediately in

front of the engine. Among personal effects found in his clothing was a diary in which was the name "C. L. Richards" and "My home is anywhere from New York to San Francisco." The remains were taken to The Dalles and buried at the expense of the county.
