MORRIS BROS. REFUSE BONDS

After several weeks of negotiations, Morris Bros. notified the city council Monday that they would not take the \$90,000 issue of local water bonds, and the deal with them is now off.

F. Batchelder against issuing them at 6 per cent without their being again advertised.

The council will now re-advertise the bonds and endeavor to sell them to another investor.

FAKE MAGAZINE AGENTS ARE SWINDLING PUBLIC

The attention of the public is called by J. W. Pifer, the local book store man, to the numerous agents working on the coast soliciting orders for magazines and collecting the money in advance. A bulletin of discharged or criminal agents published by the Periodical Publishers' Association of America contains a list of about 500 names of persons who have been operating in various states and a reward of \$25 each is offered for their arrest and conviction. A number of local people have been victimized and the remedy is wholly in the hands of the public by placing their orders with their newsdealer who is responsible and will make returns to the home office promptly and will take their subscription for any magazine desired.

Another advantage is that a subscriber can pay the newsdealer weekly or monthly.
