The City Election The city election, which occurs next Tuesday, will see seven candidates in the field for councilmen.

While there are two tickets, so to speak, there is no real issue other than that the officers who are chosen shall be those who are best constituted to deal with concluding the negotiations of taking over the old water plant and providing for a new one.

The real issue in the city election is in the selection of councilmen who will be best fitted to handle its water problem, who will be broad enough to lay aside prejudice, who will not be guided by self-interests or influenced by private considerations.

Although every effort is being made to close the negotiations for the old water system, they may, as in the past, fail; it may be necessary to carry the matter through the supreme court, and it may be necessary to adopt a new policy.

The projected permanent street improvements will come under the hand of the new council, as will also that of issuing bonds for the new water system. It will, therefore, require a broad-minded business administration and a harmonious one.

A Correction

In the editorial in last week's issue of the News discussing the water situation, the editor stated that the Oregon supreme court had the power to raise or lower the amount of the verdict given in the circuit court.

Information led us to believe that this statement was correct, but a search in the statutes defining the powers of the Oregon supreme court fails to reveal any authority giving it this right.

Another inaccuracy is said to be the figures of \$37,250 which we gave as the amount that has been expended already on the old water plant. It is stated that this amount should have been given as \$36,000, the additional \$1,250 being the amount estimated as the expense for carrying the case through the supreme court.

Gipsy Smith From the Oregonian The Oregonian has received and printed a number of letters commending Gipsy Smith and his effort to convert the people of Portland to Christianity.

But The Oregonian will not dismiss the subject without saying something more about Gipsy Smith and his ways of procuring conversions by theatrical appeals to the emotions and sentiments of his hearers.

There are backsliders—hundreds and thousands of them, no doubt—from the myriad converts of the Gipsy Smiths; but the record does not show that they committed very many crimes while at the mourners' bench or were still under the thrall of their stirring impulses toward a cleaner and better life.

FORMER LOCAL DENTIST SUSPECTED OF ROBBERY

Dr. Rupp, at one time a practicing dentist at Hood River, under the firm name of Arnold & Rupp, is in the toils of the law, according to the Oregonian.

"Through comparison of notes by Deputy Sheriffs Leonard and Phillips and Detectives Coleman and Snow, two men are in the city jail who, it is believed, attempted to rob the Yale Dental Parlors, Second and Morrison streets, Wednesday night.

"Nothing two men, one elderly, the other a boy, hanging about the North End, the deputy sheriffs called the attention of the detectives, who were at once struck by their apparent correspondence to the description of the robbers. They were arrested as vagrants and gave the names of Hugh Rupp and Walter Laidley.

OREGON APPLIES TO PLEAD FOR HARBORS

To show the tempting fruit in this part of the state which awaits improved rivers and harbors and the Panama Canal to get to hungry eastern consumers, the Portland Chamber of Commerce has arranged to send to Washington 20 boxes of the choicest Oregon apples to be distributed by the Oregon delegates during the convention of the National Rivers and Harbors Congress.

At present apples have a very low rate from the Northwest to the Atlantic seaboard, getting \$1 a hundred for a number of the best eastern consuming centers.

But unless good shipping facilities are given by river and harbor in the Northwest, the water route will be without material advantage. Unless the government's improvement work continues, Oregon will not be in shape to handle the shipping on the Pacific when the canal opens.

To impress the eastern man with the urgent needs of this region, and of the hundreds of millions of dollars in raw material and produce which is here awaiting lower rates, the Oregon men going to Washington early next month will present varied arguments about fruit production, livestock, lumber, wheat and flour and other elements of the future trade problem.
