Commencing at the quarter section corner on the south side of section 35 in township 3, north, range 10, east of Willamette Meridian, and run thence north along the quarter section line running north and south through said section 35, a distance of 18.55 chains, more or less, to the point marking the northwest corner of the tract of land owned by George H. Steinhoff and Edith O. Steinhoff, husband and wife, and run thence north, 29.08' east, along the north boundary of said Steinhoff's land a distance of 3.50 chains, more or less, to the southwest corner of the tract of land owned by Bertha E. Glass, for the point of commencement of the tract hereby described; thence running northerly along the east boundary of said Glass' land 4 chains, more or less, to the southwest corner of the tract of land now owned by George Walter Lawrence, thence running easterly along the south boundary of said Lawrence's land 11 chains, more or less, to the southeast corner thereof, thence running south parallel to the said east boundary of said Glass' land 4 chains, more or less, to a point in the road known as the Awa-lan Way, south, 59 06' east of the point of commencement; thence north, 89 06' west 11 chains, more or less, to the point of commencement.

CITIZENS PROTEST AGAINST GILLNETS

Hood River anglers are wrathful over the fact that two local fish dealers are gill netting the Hood river and thereby are threatening to destroy the trout fishing in that stream. As fishing in the river is one of the attractions and resources of the town and valley, citizens are protesting loudly against the procedure.

By placing nets across the lower part of the river and taking everything in the fish line that comes along, the stream would soon be cleaned out. While nothing can be done at present to stop these depredations, it is stated that application will be made to the state authorities to have Hood river made a spawning stream, which, if granted, will make it unlawful to use nets in it.
