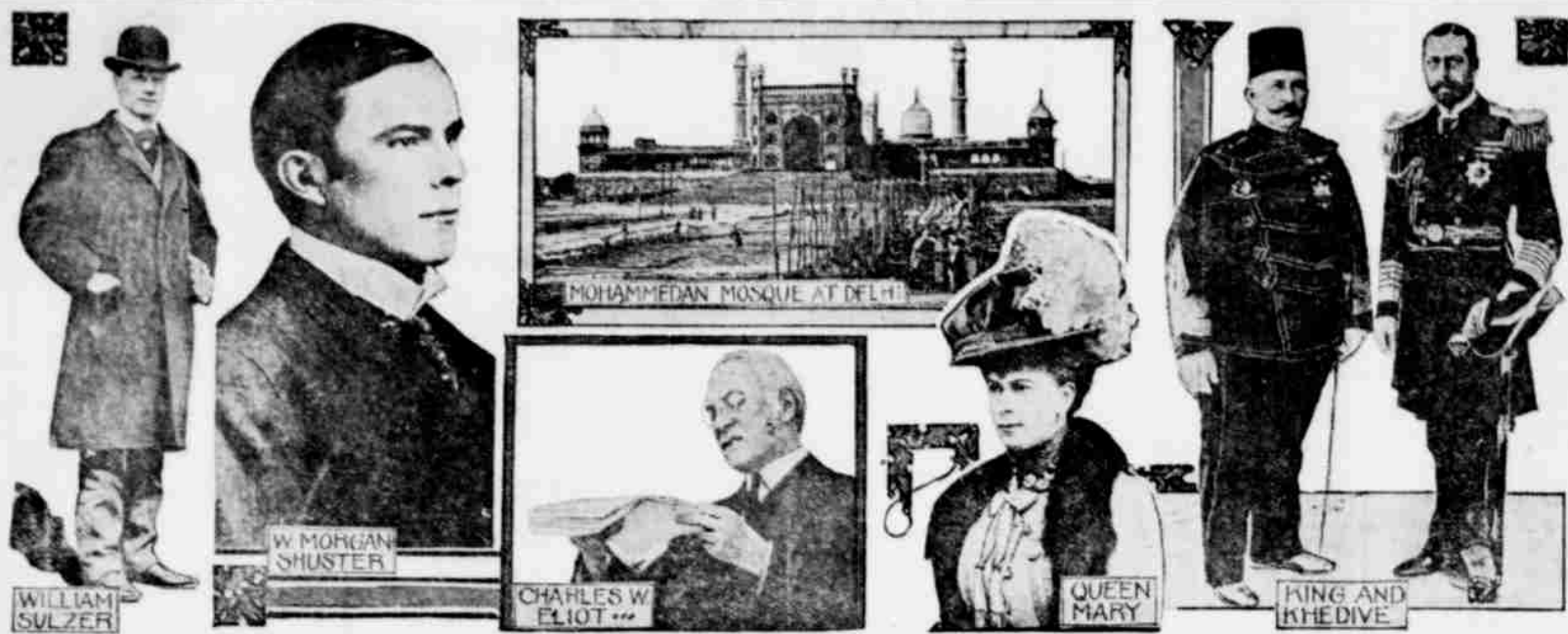


## EVENTS OF WORLD WIDE INTEREST PICTURED FOR BUSY READERS

News Snapshots  
Of the Week

The house passed William Sulzer's resolution advocating the abrogation of the treaty of 1832 with Russia on the ground that Russia has refused to allow American citizens to enter because they were of Hebrew parentage. W. Morgan Shuster held his position as treasurer general of Persia despite the strong opposition of England and Russia. Charles W. Elliot, president emeritus of Harvard university, was stricken with appendicitis in Ceylon, and an operation was performed on him. King George V. of Great Britain was proclaimed emperor of India amid scenes of unparalleled splendor at the Delhi durbar. The royal party was the guest of the khedive while en route to India. Following the coronation, the seat of government was transferred from Calcutta to Delhi.
