WILL TAX FRUIT TREES IN STATE OF WASHINGTON

Fruit trees in Washington are not to be exempt from assessment for taxation purposes. The state tax commission so ruled in a formal opinion to the assessor of Chelan county. It has been the custom in many sections of the state to exempt fruit trees, but there is no authority for this under the constitution and supreme court decisions, holds the state tax commission, although the legislature did pass a law exempting them.

The tax commission cites a decision of the supreme court to show that the legislature had no power to exempt any property from taxation. It is announced by the commission that some counties have exempted fruit trees, while in other counties the trees are taxed.

ent at the meeting to ask questions and a number availed themselves of the opportunity.

One of the interesting features of the meeting was the address by E. L. Smith, who gave some reminiscences of Lincoln. Mr. Smith attended the convention at which Lincoln was nominated and it left a vivid impression on his mind. He reviewed in an interesting manner the conditions as they existed just prior to the convention. He spoke of the attempt of the South to extend slavery into the territories and reviewed the Dred Scott decision and its effect on the people. Feeling ran high and many illustrations were given by Mr. Smith. The convention, the fight to nominate Lincoln and the storm of enthusiasm that followed his nomination were strikingly pictured.

An interesting fact brought out by Mr. Smith was that the Oregon delegate to the convention named Horace Greeley as his proxy and the latter, besides voting for Lincoln, was one of the most active workers in his behalf, so that Oregon may be said to have done much towards nominating Lincoln.

Secretary Kaufman contributed to the program an interesting Lincoln anecdote. "Illinois" was sung by a quartet which included Rev. E. A. Harris, Murray Kay, George R. Wilbur and Banks Mortimer. They were accompanied by A. L. Crocker.

C. C. Lemmon spoke in behalf of the newly-organized Good Roads League and urged that all the local boosters join. Mr. Maris, representing the O. A. C. extension department, spoke of the country life movement, mention of which is made in another column.
