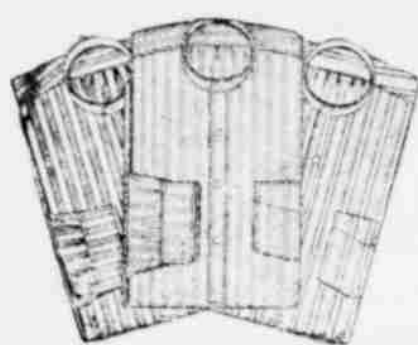

## SUGGESTS APPLE BLOSSOM FESTIVAL

At the meeting of the Commercial Club Monday evening O. P. Dabney read an interesting paper on his trip abroad with particular reference to fruit-growing in Europe. Benson, donor of the \$10,000 for the Portland road, be a guest of honor at that time.

C. T. Roberts spoke on good roads and said he would like to know what is being done with all the money raised in the county for road building. He thought the roads here were costing too much and that they could be built more cheaply. Ray Scott, the new secretary, made a few remarks on the work he is about to take up.

### Rural Carrier Examination

A rural carrier examination will be held at Hood River, Ore., for Hood River county, Saturday, March 30, 1912.

The United States Civil Service Commission announces an examination on the date and at the place named above, as a result of which it is expected to make certification to fill a vacancy in the position of rural carrier at Parkdale and other vacancies as they may occur on rural routes at post offices in the above-named county unless it shall be decided in the interests of the service to fill the vacancy by reinstatement, transfer or promotion. The usual entrance salary for rural carriers is from \$900 to \$1,000 per annum.

Application Form 1341, and full information concerning the requirements of the examination, can be secured from the secretary of the local examining board or the postmaster at any of the places named above, or from the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C.

Applications should be properly executed and filed with the Commission at Washington.

As examination papers are shipped direct from the Commission to the places of examination, it is necessary that applications be received in ample time to arrange for the examination desired at the place indicated by the applicant.

### CLARA AUGUSTA KNAPP

Clara Augusta, wife of J. J. Knapp, died at the Portland Sanitarium February 8, after an illness of five months and ten days. She suffered extremely much of the time, having undergone three surgical operations, all of which served to lessen her suffering for a time.

She met Mr. Knapp in the state of Kansas in the early part of the year '88. In the spring of 1889 Mr. Knapp came to the Pacific Coast and located in Seattle.
