FILTRATION PLANT TO BE HASTENED

In order that the heights may have an abundance of pure water at the earliest possible date this summer, the council is hastening the plans for installing a filtration plant at the upper reservoir and obtaining an additional supply of water from the Farmers' Irrigation Company.

At the meeting Monday City Engineer Morse submitted a report showing that a filtration plant costing about \$650 would filter 50,000 gallons a day. The council adopted the engineer's report and thoroughly discussed the matter. Another meeting was held last night.

It is estimated that it would take 90 days to install the filtration system and for this reason the council hopes to start work at the earliest possible moment.
