MR. DABNEY WRITES OF TRIP ABROAD

(Continued from last week)

There are many old paintings and sacred symbols in some of the more preserved rooms. The Holy Well (so called) out in the open court is 80 feet deep and one may look down into its waters and see his face as if looking into a mirror. The solid stone curbing, six inches thick, stands about four feet high and many grooves are worn one and two inches deep by the ropes when the water was drawn.

In the same court, during the last year, there have been unearthed archaic brick vaults containing the remains of men, women and children, who had been buried alive, each in a separate vault, fettered by iron bands across the forehead, breast and limbs.

Each vault contained a small lead pipe for ventilation, and after the victim was thus made secure, the arch was closed up four feet above them and they were left to the slow torture and misery. When such brutal works were done, or by whom no one of the present day is able to tell. From investigations it is learned that the cloisters are full of those vaults and God only knows why or for what reason such brutalities were committed.

In going from Ghent to Brussels we passed through a level country with many scattering trees, groves, etc. The farms are small and well cultivated, and every foot of land seems to be producing something of value. There are a few small orchards and many fields with hops. One will scarcely see a garden without a dozen or more hop vines. There is little stock in this part of the country and carts are mostly used on the farms.

The country is considerably cut up with canals, which are used for transporting the farm products.

Brussels is one of the finest cities in Europe. It is the capital and has a population of 700,000. It seemed to be in a very prosperous condition and much building was under construction. In the more modern part of the city the streets are well laid out and the buildings are of uniform height with various colors, which made a very attractive showing. The streets were mostly paved with Belgian blocks, and some of the sidewalks are of the same material.

Brussels has splendid public buildings, including churches, cathedrals, etc. The Royal Museum is well worth a visit. It contains some fine old paintings by Van Dyke, Rubens and many other noted artists.

The Law Courts is one of the largest buildings of its kind in the world, covering more than six acres of ground. It cost about two million pounds.

The Hotel De Ville is the most artistic and beautiful building in the city. 225 statues, much lace stone work and gilt adorn the outside walls while many Gothic arches and gables add to its beauty.

NEST LACE FACTORY
We next visited the fine lace factory, where a great many girls and women are employed, and where the machinery is composed of human fingers and thousands of pins, needles and bobbins. The laces are all made by hand and those employed secure two francs a day for their labor.

In that place they were making collars, cuffs, handkerchiefs and many articles for the neck and shoulders, besides silk and linen skirts, shawls, throws, etc.

In Brussels Sunday is the market day for all kinds of birds, hare flowers, etc. I never before saw such a variety of birds, from the parrot and pigeon down to the humming bird, songsters, whistlers, larks, with their various colors, and as I looked at the throng of people, with their many peculiarities, I thought of that little stanza:

"Many men of many minds,
Many birds of many kinds."

VISIT WATERLOO

The old battlefield of Waterloo is twelve miles from Brussels and in going to it we passed over the same road as did Wellington and his army a few days prior to the great battle. Much of the road is lined on each side with beautiful beach forests, and we pass by some expensive and peculiar looking buildings and elegant homes, but farther away from the city we see the characteristic farm buildings where the stock barns form a part or annex to the house.

The people seem very crude, using wooden-tooth harrows and plows that looked as though they had been

made some time before the flood. Here the line-plow wagons and carts are used, with holes bored in the hub for the purpose of oiling and then a bunch of twisted straw put in to prevent the oil from wasting. The wagons have tongues about six feet long and the horses are hitched to the end of them.

PRIMITIVE FARM METHODS

The grain is threshed on the floor in the barn with flails. In some places forked sticks were used for pitchforks and most everyone was wearing wooden shoes. In the villages they have community wells and water is carried from them by means of a yoke that fits on the back part of the neck and shoulders. To each end is attached a rope fastened to a four or five-gallon pail.

We were then at the village of Waterloo and by our own guide we were taken through the old building used as Wellington's headquarters before and during the battle. The old furniture and the bed upon which he slept the night before the battle may still be seen.
