

DECORATION DAY PROGRAM ARRANGED

Tomorrow being Decoration Day, it will be fittingly observed and a program for the day's events has been prepared under the auspices of the local G. A. R.

At 10 o'clock in the morning the G. A. R. and Women's Relief Corps will meet at the cemetery corner and will form in line to march into the cemetery. There services will be held over the grave of Past Commander George P. Crowell, after which the graves of soldiers will be decorated.

The school children will take part in a patriotic program. There will be a song, after which Lincoln's Gettysburg address will be given by Edward Struck. A requiem, "Sleep, Soldiers, Sleep," will be given by Miss Elsie McLucas, and "The Star Spangled Banner" will then be reproduced in pantomime by pupils of Miss Howard. A reading, "The Flag," will be given by Miss Elizabeth Carson and will be followed by a patriotic melody by Miss Gladys Reavis. The next number on the program will be "Our Country and Our Flag" by Comrade C. E. Kellogg.

All patriotic societies, especially the Spanish War veterans, are invited to take part in the exercises.

The morning exercises will be followed in the afternoon by a patriotic program to be given on the courthouse green at 3 p. m.

The program for the three o'clock exercises on the courthouse green will be as follows: Singing of "America;" invocation by Rev. W. B. Young; short addresses by several local speakers; "Tenting Tonight" by Miss Osgood; address of the day by Hon. H. H. Northrop of Portland; singing of "Star Spangled Banner;" benediction by Rev. J. B. Parsons.

SPECIAL ELECTION CALLED BY WEST IN ORDER TO SELECT COUNTY JUDGE

Yesterday afternoon an effort was started to unite upon a compromise candidate for county judge. The commission met with a number of interested citizens. Lawrence Blowers was mentioned as a compromise candidate. Mr. Clark has withdrawn. Attorney Stark was not prepared to make a definite announcement as to his intentions.

Instead of appointing, on his own motion, a judge to fill the vacancy made by the resignation of County Judge George D. Culbertson of Hood River county, Governor West announced Monday that he would let the voters of the county make a selection at a special election to be held Saturday afternoon, June 8.

For this purpose the governor has appointed Leslie M. Butler, G. M. Uptegrove and A. J. Derby to make arrangements for such an election.

"The election is to be held without expense to the taxpayers of the county," said Governor West. "The different judges and clerks will no doubt be willing to donate their services on the afternoon of that day, in order that the matter of naming the county judge, which means so much to the county, may be settled satisfactorily to all concerned."

Only one aspirant has announced himself so far, Attorney S. W. Stark having declared himself a candidate. His announcement appears under another head. W. L. Clark, who was mentioned as a candidate for the appointment, states that he does not care to enter into a contest for the position and that he is not inclined to become a candidate.

Statement by W. L. Clark

At the time the resignation of County Judge Culbertson was considered by the county court, the judge and commissioners of the court decided to recommend me to the governor of the state for appointment to fill the vacancy caused by Judge Culbertson's resignation.

This action of the court was endorsed by the business men of Hood River and the recommendation made. When this representation was made to me I felt that the least I could do in common courtesy to my friends was to accept the appointment if it was tendered to me by the governor.

Now, however, the governor having delegated his appointing power to the electorate of the county, I deem it incumbent upon me to withdraw my name and leave the field clear for such action as the voters of the county consider advisable for them to take.

I also wish to convey to the many friends who have offered their support and good wishes, my sincere thanks.
