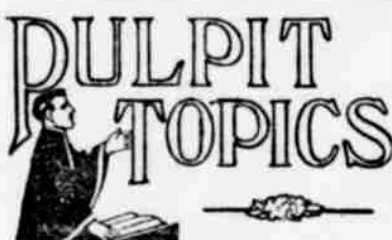
Mrs. John McCastlan returned recently from a visit to her father, E. Steptoe, at Forest Grove.
