LIVE NEWS FROM 'ROUND THE STATE

Four legs and two tails is the double portion of anatomy possessed by a chicken hatched on the ranch of Charles Wiley, of Tumalo. The chick is living and doing well, and is a great curiosity walking on its four legs.

Borden, the baby elephant with the Sells-Floto show, died at Pendleton the last of the week, of pneumonia. The circus has been having hard luck since leaving Portland. More than 20 horses were burned to death while the circus was being moved from The Dalles to Pendleton.

Calling attention to the fact that sufficient interest is not being taken in school elections, State Superintendent of Public Instruction Alderman has issued a letter to patrons of the schools of the state, urging them to be present at the elections to be held Monday in the districts in which they reside.

Members of an organization called the Taxpayers' League, about 20 in all, met at Dufur and considered attempting to call a special election for the recall of County Judge A. E. Lake and Commissioners C. H. Stoughton and H. C. Rooper. The Taxpayers' League is opposed to the erection of a new court house.

The Borah-Jones three years' homestead bill became a law a couple of days ago, at which time it was signed by President Taft in the presence of a delegation of Western congressmen.

Six persons were struck by lightning at Klamath Falls in a storm which preceded the most severe downpour of hail ever recorded in Klamath County. None of those struck will die, it is thought, although one, a baby in arms, is in a critical condition. Three inches of hail fell in less than half an hour.

CANADIAN AND ENGLISH FRUIT PROSPECTS GOOD

The fruit crop report of the Canadian department of agriculture, just issued, shows that, on the whole, apples are doing remarkably well. Little bud and twig killing have been reported and the prospects are favorable for a good crop.

The report is confined almost exclusively to conditions under which the trees and plantations have come through the winter, determined partly by the summer and autumn conditions of 1911, and partly by the winter and spring weather of the present year.

Fruit prospects all over Great Britain and Ireland are, on the whole, favorable. The winter was not severe. Spring opened up warm and growth was good. No unusual infestations of insect pests or fungous diseases are reported, and it can be said that there are no discouraging features.

SCHOOL ELECTION WILL BE HELD NEXT MONDAY

The annual election of school directors will be held next Monday, June 17. There will be an open election this year instead of at a meeting as in former years. Polls will be open at the Park street schoolhouse from two until six o'clock in the afternoon, so that all may have an opportunity to vote. Two directors will be elected, one to fill the expired term of Mrs. F. H. Button and another to fill the vacancy left by the resignation of C. H. Vaughan.

BUMPER CROPS WILL SPELL PROSPERITY

Bumper crops and prevailing good prices are expected to put the farmers of the Pacific Northwest in high good humor this Fall and, through him, the three states are expected to prosper as never before. Every indication is for big yields in all the staple products and for some, prices will be very high.

The biggest wheat crop ever harvested is predicted for Oregon, Washington and Idaho and it is thought the yield will reach 70,000,000 bushels, worth \$52,500,000. Oats are expected to add \$18,675,000 to this new wealth and hay the neat sum of \$35,300,000. The wool crop is estimated to be worth \$6,600,000, and hops \$4,650,000. This is a total income for the producers of the three states of almost \$150,000,000. If the manufactured products were added to the wealth of the soil, it is probable the total would fall not far below \$500,000,000 for the year.

In addition to this gigantic sum will be the proceeds from the fruit crop, which will be the largest in the history of the Northwest.

CONVICTS NEAR SALEM LAY FINE MACADAM ROAD

Work on the Salem end of the Pacific Highway, which, when completed, will connect the state capital with Portland by a fine macadam road, has been progressing satisfactorily this spring, under the personal supervision of George Rogers, member of the state highway commission appointed by Governor West. Several miles of road, beginning at the edge of Salem, have been completed.

"This work has been done by convicts," said Governor West. "We made arrangements for securing a rock crusher and, under supervision of Mr. Rogers, convicts have put down as fine macadam road as can be found anywhere. We are ready to proceed just as fast as districts provide for the expense."

The highway is on the east side of the river and will be part of the proposed loop from Portland to Salem, the Pacific Highway being on the east side of the capital road on the west side.

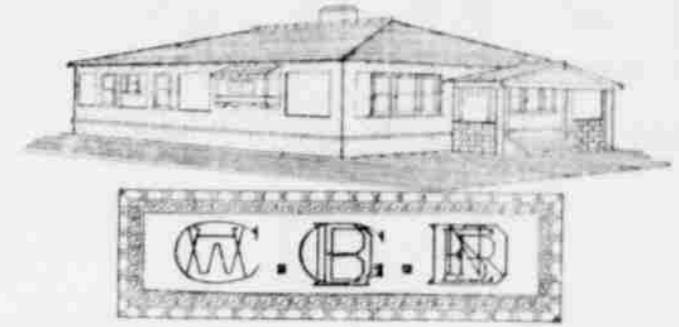
