MANY EMIGRANTS WHEN CANAL OPENS

Delegates to the 39th annual conference of Charities and Corrections, gathered the last of the week at Cleveland, O., for a general session. Arguing that the Pacific Coast is in actual need of having the 1913 meeting in one of its cities, delegates from Seattle are making a determined fight to have the next conference there. "With the opening of the Panama Canal," said a delegate, "a vast horde of European emigrants, attracted by the cheaper transportation rates, will pour into the Pacific Coast cities. It is highly necessary that the people out there be awakened to the situation and instructed in time as to the proper means of dealing with the emigrant question. "So far, Western Coast cities have had to contend with almost none of the problems that the cities of the Atlantic seaboard have faced. If we can get the 1913 conference of Charities and Corrections, we will have taken an important step toward arousing our people to proper action in the future."

MANY VARIETIES WILL THRIVE HERE

According to Professor C. L. Lewis of the O. A. C., the leading varieties of apples in the Hood River Valley are the Yellow Newtown, Spitzenberg, Ortley, Jonathan, Red Cheek, and Arkansas Black. For Pears: D'Anjou is the leading variety and seems to grow well. Other varieties worth trying would be Bartlett, Patrick Barry, Howell, and Glou Moreau. The varieties at Mosier are similar to those at Hood River. Very few other fruits are grown in these districts except for home use. For Raspberries: Outhbert; and for Strawberries, Clark's Seedling. In the Upper Hood River Valley variety adaptation is still in an experimental stage. The Winter Banana seems to do well, and it may be that the Bellelous will be good for that district, also Gano, Jonathan, etc. In the vicinity of The Dalles we find a district especially adapted for peaches, prunes, cherries and grapes. The district above The Dalles is cultivated to apples. For peaches the principal ones are Early Crawford, Late Crawford, Salway, Elberta, Muir, Orange and Lem on Cling, although many other varieties would do well. Cherries: The Lambert, Bing and Royal Anne do well. Grapes: Such varieties as Tokay and Muscat grow successfully and color beautifully.

Distribution of Your Household Income

THE HOUSEWIFE SHOULD DISTRIBUTE HER INCOME AS FOLLOWS: ONE-FOURTH FOR FOOD, A FIFTH FOR RENT, 15 PER CENT EACH FOR SICKNESS, OPERATING EXPENSES OF THE HOUSEHOLD AND CLOTHING, AND ONE-FOURTH FOR THE HIGHER NEEDS, AMUSEMENT, CULTURE, EDUCATION AND TRAVEL.

Keep your accounts separately and once a week put them together. Make comparisons to see if you are making the right division and if you have managed well. Ask yourself, "Have I beaten the budget or have the EXPENDITURES OUTDISTANCED THE AMOUNT?" It is only in this way that you will do better tomorrow than you did today.

Don't worry too much about your accounts if they don't come out to the exact penny. You are not a bookkeeper, but a HOUSEHOLD ENGINEER. If you enter 90 per cent or even three-fourths of your expenditures you will have enough to judge by.

You may hate to keep accounts, but keep it up long enough to get your bearings, then drop it if you like and try again. You will finally FORM HABITS ACCORDING TO YOUR BUDGET. An income is of course necessary, but the use of money really decides the comfort of the home.

"Everybody's Doin' It"

\$1,000,000 SAWMILL PLANNED FOR BEND

Announcement has just been made by the Brooks, Robertson and Scanton-Gibson Companies, holders of millions of feet of Central Oregon timber, that a mill to cost \$1,000,000 will be built at Bend, construction to start within 18 months. The plant will have a minimum payroll of \$25,000 a month, employing 500 men. Another mill, plans for which are yet in embryo, will likely be erected there also by the Mueller Land & Timber Company. It is announced by the Bend Water, Light & Power Company that a \$40,000 electrical power plant will be erected, work to start soon. It will be built on the unit plan, two units being put in now and others added as the growth of the town demands. The building will be of brick or concrete. The total cost of the completed plant will be \$80,000.
