HOPES THAT OREGON WOMEN GET VOTES

Miss Bessie Henry, who is principal of a large private school at Colorado Springs, Colo., has just come to Hood River to spend the summer on her ranch, Clavelly Orchard, on Willow Flat. The message which she brings to her Oregon sisters is that she hopes to see them line up soon with the equal suffrage states, among which Colorado is included.

Miss Henry says that although the women of Colorado did not seek suffrage, they have used it to excellent advantage and have fulfilled their duties as citizens in a manner which, she says, has been most beneficial to the state. If for no other reason, she believes that women should be given the ballot in order to counteract the ignorance of the uneducated foreigners who are now able to use the ballot after residence here. She declares that, while many of these foreigners are literally driven to the polls and told how to vote, with a financial inducement to back it up, the women of the country have sufficient intelligence and independence to cast their ballots in a way which will throw their influence on the right side. This is particularly true, she believes, when local issues are at stake. She does not believe in women holding office.

Miss Henry was accompanied here by Miss Emma B. Park of Colorado Springs. In returning to Hood River for her third summer, she expressed her delight at being back and declared that she has never seen any country which could compare in beauty to Hood River Valley.

FREEWATER-MILTON BERRIES ATTACKED

Two distinct but closely allied species of grubs are at work on the roots of the strawberries grown in the Freewater-Milton district, according to Assistant Entomologist A. L. Lovett of the Oregon Agricultural College crop pest force, who recently returned from a visit to the vicinity.

"I found the Otiorhynchus sulcatus, the larger species, more limited in its range, and the Otiorhynchus ovatus, the smaller, in greater numbers in a much greater area, and decidedly more destructive," says Mr. Lovett.

"The adult of the pest, commonly known as the strawberry root weevil, is a beetle, elongate, about three sixteenths of an inch, and dark brown. The head has a distinct beak, and the wing covers are pitted. The new brood emerges early in May and are now busy laying small, round, shiny, white eggs in the soil at the base of the plants. These eggs hatch 5 to 9 days after as small grubs which seek at once the fibrous rootlets about the crown of the plant and feed upon them. When mature they form an earthen cell, contract, and slowly transform to a pupa, showing the developing legs, beak and wings of the mature beetle.

"The adult beetle feeds on the foliage of the strawberry, as well as of the blackberry, loganberry, sweet clover, and certain native grasses. The grub, too, feeds as well on the roots of the blackberry, dewberry, loganberry, clover, native grasses, and sorrel."

Notice of Improvement of Prospect Avenue

Notice is hereby given that pursuant to Ordinance No. 388, passed by the Common Council on the 13th day of June, 1912, and approved by the Mayor on the 15th day of June, 1912, for the improvement of Prospect Avenue from the west curb line of Second Street west to the east line of Eighth Street, except in front of property as permits for the improvement of which under this ordinance shall have been issued; that bids will be received by the undersigned City Recorder at his office, 211 Oak street in said city, up to 12 o'clock noon on the 1st day of July, 1912, for the improvement of said street by grading the sidewalk and the roadway from property line to property line between said points, and the construction of cement sidewalks and curbs on both sides of the said street between said points where the same are not already built and in place, which contract shall be done under the contract and the order of the plans and specifications on file in the office of the City Surveyor. The work of grading the sidewalk and curbs shall be let in one contract and the construction of cement sidewalks and curbs shall be let in a separate contract and each of said contracts shall be required to be completed within sixty days from the date of awarding the same.

Said bids will be opened by the Street Committee as soon as practical after the time fixed for receiving the bids, and the several bids, together with the summary thereof, shall be reported to the Common Council at its next regular meeting thereafter, to-wit, on the 1st day of July, 1912, at the Council Chambers in the City of Hood River at the hour of 8 o'clock p. m., at which time the bids will be considered.

Notice is further given that any interested party may file his objection to the letting of said contract within the time specified for receiving bids, and that the same will be transmitted to the City Council along with said bids for their consideration at said meeting. The person firm or corporation to whom the contract is let will be required to enter into an agreement to the effect that said contractor shall look alone for payment for material and work to such particular portion of the fund to be assessed upon the property liable to pay for such improvement and paid into the City treasury for that purpose, as shall be assessed to the property in front of which and to the charge of which a particular part of the improvement to be done by the successful bidder is to be made and collected and paid into the City treasury, and such contractor shall in no event require the City of Hood River or any of its officers or agents to pay the same, except out of such particular portion of said funds as assessed or collected into the City treasury, and that purpose of such improvement, nor seek to enforce payment of the same or any part thereof against the City of Hood River or any of its officers or any local process or otherwise, except out of such particular fund.

All bids must state price for grading said streets to grade and price for constructing said curbs and sidewalks, which work shall be done in the manner and form provided for in General Improvement Ordinance No. 184 of the City of Hood River. No bids will be received which specify more than one price on said work chargeable to one block in length. A bond for the faithful performance of the contract to an amount equal to 10 per cent of the estimated contract price will be required of the successful bidder, the Council reserving the right to reject any and all bids.

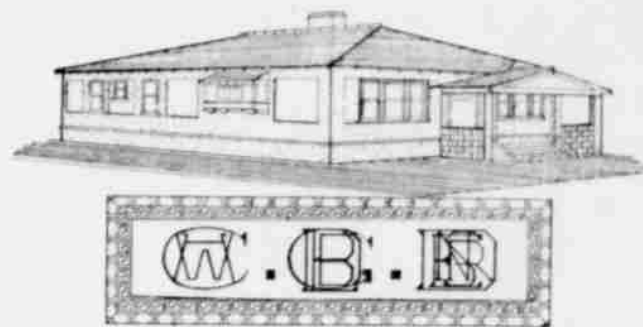

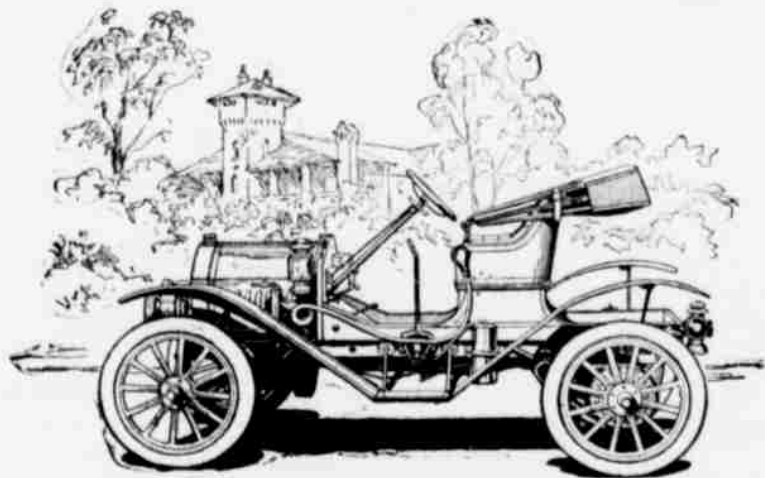
