REMEMBER that all pleasure and all happiness depend upon the normal exercise of faculty and that by consequence happiness is a function of the trained and active body and mind.

NEVER look for something for nothing. Make up your mind to earn everything, and remember that opportunity is the only thing that any one can donate you without demoralizing you and doing you an injury.

REMEMBER that work, always work, for the acquirement of knowledge, possessions and power is to yield you all your happiness and that there will never come a time to quit.

JUNE BUDDING IS NOT RECOMMENDED

Many horticulturists say June budding is not satisfactory because buds of current season's growth are not mature enough to permit their use so early in the season. As a result, most budding, it is recommended, should be done in August or September, the buds being dormant until the following spring.

Where buds are kept dormant until June, however, great success has been had with June budding, and it is recommended to those who would bud old trees, or even to those who wish to propagate nursery stock.

The whole secret is to have dormant buds to use, and in order to get them it is necessary to cut the propagating wood when the trees are dormant, just as you would cut grafting wood. Then this wood must be kept where it is cool enough so that it will not put forth growth, and moist enough not to dry out, and dry enough not to rot.

In the Middle West, it may be that June-budding with buds of current season's growth is satisfactory, but in the Northwest generally dormant budding will be found of great advantage. Even in the Middle states it may be found quite advantageous in working over old trees, for the mature buds of the previous season's growth seem to do better under thick bark than young, tender buds do.

When dormant buds are inserted the limbs in which they are placed should be broken off beyond the bud. If they are small; if large, they should be cut off and the stub waxed over.

A School to Be Proud Of

When the green of the clover shows up and the white drives stand out in contrast, with the pine trees waving above, the schoolhouse and outbuildings in the background, a bit of beauty will be added to the charms of the valley that will go far towards advertising us as the kind of a community we say we are.

The improvements also include a floor in the stalls of the sheds providing shelter for the ponies that carry the younger generation to and from school. The task of keeping the stalls clean is up to each individual rider and the trustees are making it possible for the youthful riders to do so and at the same time making comfortable quarters for their "Black Beauties."

The gentlemen comprising the board of the Pine Grove school deserve the thanks of the community at large for setting such a good example and it is to be hoped that the residents near the school will appreciate the value added to surrounding property and assist the board in keeping the improvement in as good order at all times as it deserves.
