Unless that mole that is working about the premises is making unsightly ridges on the lawn it will be a pretty good idea to let the little fellow live. He will not only kill a good many white grubs working in the roots of the grass, but many others that may be making headquarters in the flower and vegetable gardens.

Many of the intestinal ills of the small child, as well as epidemics of diseases which afflict older people, might easily be avoided if the milk used were kept in clean vessels and teurized before using-that is, held at a temperature of at least 150 degrees F. not less than thirty minutes. This treatment not only destroys germs that cause putrefaction, but the bacilli of typhoid fever, scarlet fever and diphtheria.

Two deaths and thirty-two cases of typhoid in the vicinity of Anoka, Minn., have been traced to the enting of butter made from foul cream produced in two or three filthy dairies in the locality. The health officer, who directed the investigation into the causes of the outbreak of the epidemic, stated that it was a marvel that worse diseases than typhoid had not broken out as a result of the germ producing condition found in some of the dairies.

The luxuriant appearance of the wild sweet clover in many places where Imestone crops out-along railway cuts and on the dump heaps adjacent to limestone quarries seems to point to the fact that many solls should be rather heavily limed and sweetened before clover, alfalfa or any other legume will do well thereon. The farmer who has had trouble in getting a field of alfalfa started would do well to take stock of this quite evident fact.

Thorough cultivation during the growing season is viewed as indispensable for young orchards through all of the irrigated districts of the west, and during the past two years the same principle has applied with nearly equal force in the central and eastern portions of the country that were visited with drought. Such frequent cultivation, even during a very dry senson, will keep the surface soil mellow and enable the soil to retain the largest possible amount of moisture.

A large lawn in the vicinity in which the writer lives is being kept mowed this season by a flock of sheep, a movwhile woven wire fence being used to confine the sheep on the parts of the lawn desired. The lady who has charge of this experiment states that as soon as the sheep were turned on the lawn they went after the dandelions, eating the blossoms first, then the leaves and crown, and finally gnawing off the upper portion of the roots. 
