CLOUD GAP INN IS OPENED FOR SEASON

Cloud Gap Inn opened for the season on Monday. Dorsey B. Smith, who is its manager, arrived on that day with a new Lozier automobile, which will be used to carry guests to the Inn from this city. The machine was brought from Portland on the Dalles Gatzert. Mr. Smith anticipates a successful season for the Inn. He said:

"Mt Hood should be the principal drawing card for Portland and the Northwest and we all appreciate the wonderful trip through Hood River and Hood River valley. Every visitor passing through the valley is impressed with the wonderful opportunities there and I am sure they do the valley much good."

Regarding the charging of tolls on the road to the Inn, Mr. Smith said: "I notice some unfavorable comment on the collection of toll for the use of the private road to Cloud Gap Inn. It costs considerable money to keep this road in repair and to open and close it every year. The toll does not begin to pay this expense and we are further planning on doing considerable work on the road in the way of removing some rocky points and reducing some heavy pitches at different places."

Guests to the Inn will be routed at the Hotel Oregon this year as usual.

APPLE INDUSTRY'S NEEDS DISCUSSED

Standardization of Northwestern apples, an effective and persistent advertising campaign, organization of responsible local associations, construction of frost-proof storehouses in orchards and central points, development of adequate transportation and market facilities and ways and means for proper distribution of the fruit, were discussed by Waldo G. Paine, second vice-president and general traffic manager of the Spokane & Inland Empire Electric Railway system, at a recent meeting of the executive committee of the Inland Empire Federation of Commercial Clubs, representing a total membership of 15,000 in the four Northwestern states, at Rosalie, Wash. He said in part:

"There never was a more opportune time, in this age of unparalleled progress and wonderful opportunities and tremendous possibilities, for the centralization or concentration of effort and endeavor, but in this, as in every large undertaking, team work is absolutely and positively necessary to its growth. In fact the mental attitude of those interested in the foundation upon which the material enlargement of any movement is constructed. Thus, then, energetic optimism and intelligent team work must go hand in hand to vitalize the plan."

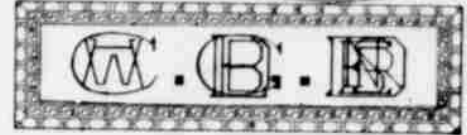
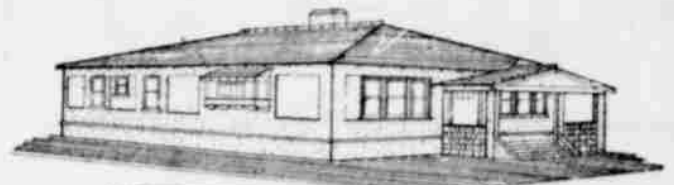
