Thomas W. Lawson, who spent several weeks in Hood River valley last summer, has the following statement to make in reply to a telegram sent him by the New York World:

After careful study of the problem set forth in your telegram, were I graduating today from a college, East, West or South, I would head straight for the great, undeveloped Northwest.

I would buy my ticket for Portland, Ore. I would spend my first week in that splendid proto-type of our old, conservative and intellectual but withal courageous and hustling New England capital of a half century ago. While in Portland I would haunt the reportorial departments of the daily newspapers, the ever-welcoming rooms of the numerous business clubs and the booming departments of the great railroads and navigation lines centering in that superb Pacific metropolis.

Then I would light out and into the modern paradise of happiness and dollars, the virgin interior of that wonderful state, a world in itself, containing to spare and then lots more everything that makes for health, hustle, prosperity and contentment for man, woman and child. ### WENATCHEE PLANS FOR WIDE MARKET

H. I. Shotwell and Grant Patton, directors of the Wenatchee Valley Fruit Growers' association, have just returned from a trip to the eastern states looking over the apple market for the present season and in an interview with the Wenatchee Republic state:

"The results of our four weeks' trip," said Mr. Shotwell this morning, "surprised myself and the other three members of our party. We found a lively demand among discriminating dealers for Wenatchee apples, and we have arranged to move the association's output to consumers through representative and responsible dealers. I feel satisfied that the association's plan solves the marketing problem. Now that we have bargained to supply the dealers with Wenatchee fruit we must get it for them. They are depending upon us, and the growers must co-operate in the plan."

Mr. Shotwell declares that in the barrel districts the apple crop conditions are as promising at least as they were last year, while in all the box districts the indications are for much heavier yields than last year. He returned here by way of the Canadian Pacific railroad through northwestern Canada.

"Northwest Canada," he said, "affords natural markets for our lower grade apples and for our soft fruits. Considerable of our output has gone there in past seasons, particularly last year, and it has given the utmost satisfaction. In all the Canadian northwest cities the dealers were the association and there is no doubt of our doing a good business with them."

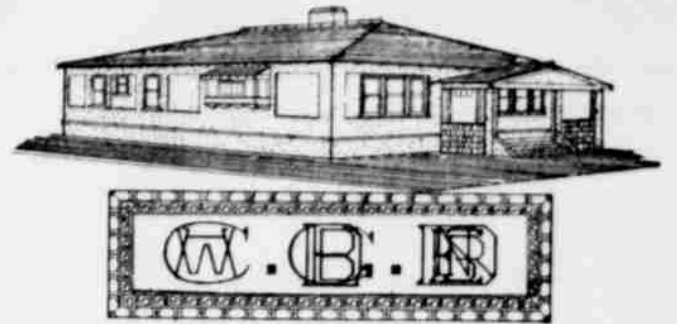
