FRUIT FACTORY ON BIG SCALE
A fruit factory to cost \$125,000 and with an additional \$125,000 for working capital is planned for the Yakima valley by Seattle capitalists. Rufus Wilson, recently of the Seattle Chamber of Commerce, is in North Yakima in the interest of the undertaking. It is the intention of the people with whom he is identified to utilize the orchard waste for all the by-products down to the alcohol and to make everything count. By the use of storage facilities in connection with the plant it is expected that the evaporator end of the factory will operate for nine months in the year. All the dried and evaporated apples now used in the west come from the east and other dried fruit comes from the south.—Herald.

PARCELS POST RATES FIGURED OUT BY BOURNE
How the parcels post regulations embodied in the pending postoffice appropriation bill will charge for the transportation of small packages is explained in a statement by Senator Bourne of Oregon. If finally approved by the house and senate conferees and by President Taft the rates will be:
For city and rural delivery, 5 cents for the first pound and 1 cent for each additional pound.
For a 50-mile zone, 5 cents for the first pound and 3 cents for each additional pound.
For the 300-mile zone, 9 cents for the first pound and 7 cents for each additional pound.
For the 1800-mile zone, 11 cents for the first pound and 10 cents for each additional pound.
Above the 1800-mile zone, 12 cents flat for each pound.
