### BURGLAR ENTERS DALLES HOMES

The residences of Dr. J. A. Reuter, Nathan Whealdon and Louis Rorden in The Dalles were entered during the week by a burglar whose spoils totaled about \$19 in cash and two gold watches. The police were notified shortly after 5 o'clock by Dr. Reuter, who was awakened when the thief left his residence through a window.

When Mr. Rorden arose in the morning he found his clothes strewn about the room but nothing was missing although his watch and several dollars lay on the dresser. The thief, however, made away with Mrs. Rorden's purse containing about \$4 which hung in a closet.

At the Whealdon home the thief gained an entrance through a window and took a watch and \$15 from Mr. Whealdon's clothes. He did not venture up stairs and nothing else on the lower floor was molested.

Again at the Reuter residence the robber entered through a window and walked deliberately into Dr. Reuter's sleeping room, picked up a watch and chain, valued at \$150, and immediately left the house. When going out of the window the burglar made a little noise which awakened Dr. Reuter, but when the latter looked out he could see nothing of the intruder.

That the thief is some local person is the belief of the local police and they are working on that clue. His operations were very amateurish which is evidenced by the fact that he passed up \$20 which were in Dr. Reuter's clothes. Also at the Rorden home the robber passed up a considerable sum of money.

### Baby Show at Salem.

The State Fair board has voted \$500 to be used as prizes for the Eugenics Exposition planned for Wednesday, September 4. This is a feature of the State Fair this year for the first time and it is expected it will attract a great deal of attention. It is to be really a scientific baby show, children up to three years old being eligible for prizes. A \$50 silver cup will be offered for the best boy and the best girl in the show and six cups for the best boy and girl in three divisions, the ages running from six months to three years.

Medical experts will judge the children entered from the standpoint of physical perfection, much as livestock is judged. O. M. Plummer has been made superintendent of the Eugenics show and is hopeful of having 200 children entered at Salem. He hopes various granges, commercial bodies and districts will hold local shows in each county, sending the best boy and girl from the county to the state competition.

### FRUIT EXCHANGE ESTABLISH BRANCH

To extend the usefulness of the Northwestern Fruit Exchange, a branch has been opened in London by W. F. Gwin, general manager, and it is hoped to extend the fame of Northwest fruit throughout Europe. It is believed the present business there can be increased largely.

### Influx to Pacific Coast

Dr. Paul Ritter, Minister from Switzerland to the United States, believes large numbers of his countrymen will come to the Pacific Coast and settle when the Panama Canal shall have been opened. He was entertained at luncheon by the Portland Commercial Club the past week. He looks for a heavy movement of thirty European farmers to this state as soon as the way is opened.

### Fruit Packers to Vie.

Two medals will be awarded by the Northwest Fruit Exchange at the Northwest Land Products Show to be held in Portland in November, for the two best 25-box exhibits. The first prize will be a gold medal and the second a silver medal. It is expected that there will be between 75 and 100 entries. The medals will be awarded to packers and not to exhibitors.

### Big Apple Orchard.

It is said that Fred Lang and associates of San Bernardino, Calif., are clearing 2,000 acres of desert land west of Victorville, for the purpose of planting one of the largest apple orchards in the world. The water question has been solved by the sinking of wells.
