Wilmer Sieg, manager of the Apple Growers' Union, who recently went East on business connected with the Union, reports a very encouraging outlook for the Hood River apple, and states that the buyers are more impressed than ever with the Hood River fruit and that they are making early arrangements for this year's stock. Special efforts are being made to extend the foreign trade and already one car has been sold to a South American firm. Many orders are being received for Arkansas Blacks and growers are urged to rush their estimates to the Union. Mr. Sieg will be on the program at the Chicago convention of the International Apple Shippers' Association that meets August 7 to 9. While Mr. Sieg is boosting for the Hood River valley he is being besieged by hundreds of people who want information relative to the famous apple valley.
