TOMATO PLANTS SUFFER BLIGHT

If someone could manufacture an efficient remedy for the counteracting of tomato blight he would probably have a small fortune at his command.

The tomato crop of the Hood River valley is practically out of commission this season and this is also true of many other sections.

Allie Henderson, the premier tomato grower of White Salmon and Binzen, was in the city Saturday and stated to a New's representative that practically his entire crop was injured by blight this year. When asked if he knew any remedy for the prevention of the condition he stated that there was nothing that he had ever discovered that could be used as a treatment for this condition. He stated that the Japanese gardeners on the Washington side of the river had a theory that to plant tomatoes where they would be in the shade a large part of the time would prevent the blight but that there was nothing to this theory.

Mr. Henderson has nearly 50,000 plants set out this year and he figures that if he secures 10 per cent of a crop that he will be doing as well as the outlook indicates. If the plants were now free from disease he would be shipping 1000 crates per day.

EARLY BIRD IS AFTER WORM

Action will be taken in a few days in the matter of securing exhibits from the Wenatchee valley for display in the various land product shows that will be held on the Pacific coast this fall, says the Republic.

Heretofore it has been rather difficult to secure fruit for exhibition purposes. This was not due to the fact that the orchardists were reluctant in giving it. They were eager to give, but had not time to select and bring the specimens to town.

C. A. Harris, chairman of the exhibit committee of the Wenatchee Commercial club, said this morning the committee is considering the employment of a man to collect the fruit.

"I think that a man should be hired for six or eight weeks to look after the work of collecting exhibits in this valley," he declared this morning. "The grower is willing to give fruit for advertising purposes but has not the time to look after it, especially in the busy harvest season. Orchardists should be induced to make more individual displays at these land shows."

The fact that free space and cash prizes will be given to individual exhibitors at the Land Products show in Portland this fall should be a special inducement for Wenatchee growers to make entries there, and specimens of our fine fruit should be displayed at all the exhibitions in the east.

STUDENT GRADUATES IN DEMAND

Fruit ranching will engage the majority of the graduates from the division of horticulture of the Oregon Agricultural College. Four are on the Cold Stream Estate in British Columbia, Knight Pearcey of Portland, Mark G. Luffy of Salem, John D. Griffin of Astoria and L. L. Palmer of Central Point are all foremen of various lines of work there, Mr. Palmer being in charge of the control of blight. Mr. Pearcey expects ultimately to engage in prune growing in the Willamette Valley. Jay P. Green of Twin Falls, Idaho, has returned to take charge of his father's ranch there, and Glover Carrol of Portland is managing his father's orchards in the Rogue River Valley. S. B. Boddinhouse of Wilmette, Ill., is in horticulture work in the White Salmon district, and Robert A. Cook of Ontario is in the fruit growing business in Eastern Oregon. Frank H. Boulton of Portland has undertaken general farming near Sheridan. Gordon G. Brown of Corvallis expects to go into the prune and cherry business in the Willamette Valley, and Vane G. Gibson of Jamestown, Ind., will also engage in horticultural work. Frank M. Cline of Los Angeles, Calif., will be connected with the citrus industry in Southern California, and C. E. Shultz of Corvallis will be in the same business in the San Joaquin Valley, Calif. Paul H. Spilman is connected with one of the college demonstration farms. Sam H. Arbutnot of Corvallis remains at the college for graduate work.

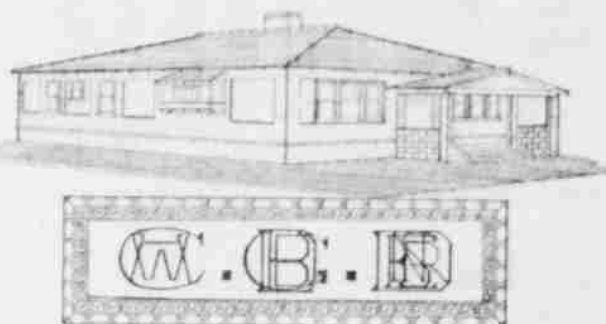
