BELIEVES CANNERY WOULD BE SUCCESS

Commenting upon a recent editorial in the News, C. J. Calkins, president and manager of the Hood River Apple Vinegar Company, says that he believes a fruit cannery in this city would not only be a commercial success but that it would also furnish a lucrative market for considerable quantities of local fruit and thereby benefit the ranchers.

"There is a good market for canned and dried fruits," says Mr. Calkins, "and conditions here are, in my opinion, favorable for the successful operation of a fruit cannery and an evaporator. Strawberries, cherries, apples, pears and peaches could be used, as well as loganberries, for gines. which there is a good demand when canned.

Mr. Calkins says that the company has been contemplating installing the necessary equipment to operate dust prevention. a cannery in connection with their other lines. Last year they put up 1000 cases of canned apples, which towns and cities. were marketed to good advantage.

"We are convinced that a cannery and evaporator could be operated g with mutual advantage to ourselves and to the local fruit growers," con tinued Mr. Calkins. "With a com paratively small financial co-operation in the way of stock, we would be admirably equipped to carry on such a cannery and evaporator in connection with our present busi-

Two or three concerns have been impressed with the local field and have made propositions of erecting a cannery, on the condition, however, that they be furnished with a site and that stock to the amount of \$25,000 or \$30,000 be subscribed in addition to which they asked that a substantial donation of stock be given them.

Mr. Calkins says: "Our company has been built up and equipped by outside capital. We have establish. ture. ed a reputation and secured markets. If between \$5000 and \$10,000 worth tion. of stock could be sold we would be n a position to do canning and evaporating on a remunerative basis. Indeed, we hope to be able to do so in time to handle next year's

The company's plant is being enlarged this year to about four times the capacity of last season. Larger presses are being installed as well as an additional tankage of about 150,000 gallons.

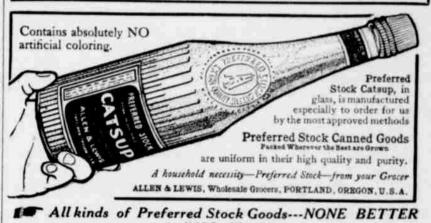

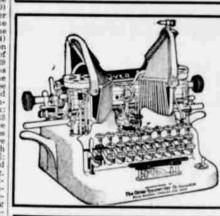
