Manager Sieg of the Union says that he has received word from canneries which have heretofore taken local pears that they will not can any this year, the California canneries being oversupplied with this stock.

## HOOD RIVER BOAT IS TO TRY HALIBUT FISHING

Commodore O. C. Dean, who is in charge of the Hood River-White Salmon ferry line of boats, has taken the larger boat off the Hood River run and has placed it in commission off Newport to engage in the halibut fishing industry. Mr. Dean states that he has located the halibut beds and that on a single trip the boat brought in nearly two tons of fish. The Commodore will spend a large portion of his time at Newport during the halibut fishing season.
