One test must be the number of separate firms doing business in the United States. The general organization of trusts and railroad combinations on a modern scale began in the eighties. Since then the number of firms in the country has grown from a million to a million and a half. Plainly, taking the growth of the number of firms, the OPPORTUNITIES OF INDIVIDUAL INITIATIVE HAVE INCREASED and not diminished. ECONOMIC QUALITY REQUIRES FAIR, EQUAL AND INCREASING OPPORTUNITY FOR ECONOMIC INVESTMENT. THE WEALTH OF THE COUNTRY HAS DOUBLED SINCE THE REIGN OF THE GREAT CORPORATIONS BEGAN.

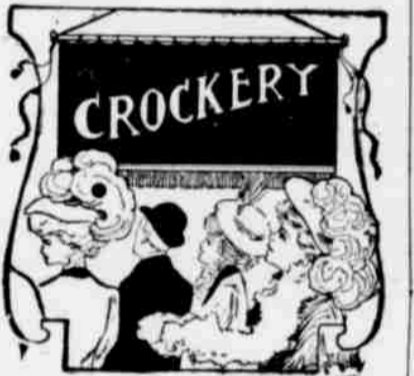
OAK GROVE
