NEWS NOTES FROM AROUND THE STATE

Summer and Abert Lakes in Central Oregon are to be made to yield up the wealth of salts in their waters. A Los Angeles company with large capital has secured a long lease on 88,000 acres about these lakes and is building a refining plant for evaporating the water. It is estimated that not less than 100,000 tons of products will be secured annually.

Plans are well along to plant a large Polish colony in Oregon. The Polish Society of Philadelphia is seeking from 5,000 to 100,000 acres of good land in a body suited for this purpose and hopes to bring about 250 Polish families here within the coming year. The society is in correspondence with Oregon people with a view to securing such a tract.

Uncle Sam proposes to be the big brother of the Oregon farmer. A movement has just been started whereby the Department of Agriculture, the Salem Board of Trade and the Oregon Agricultural College will co-operate to maintain an agricultural specialist in Marion county and others will soon be placed. The expense is distributed between the various interests and farmers are advised as to the best methods.

John W. Shattuck, Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. John W. Shattuck of Gresham, Oregon, and two boy companions, perished of hunger and exposure in the mountains near Juneau, Alaska, and their bodies have been found.

A big threshing machine owned by the father of the victim crushed out the life of 8-year-old Wilfred Gaskill, son of Mr. and Mrs. Frederick Gaskill, residing near La Grande.

Clarence Dietz, son of John Dietz of the famous Cameron dam case in Wisconsin, is now living in Wedderburn, Or., and employed at the mill of the Wedderburn Trading Company.

Despite the efforts of her aged grandmother, Mrs. E. J. Bworsback, who folded the 4-year-old child in her arms and tried to smother the blaze that was consuming her, little Dorothy Cochran, of 942 Albina avenue, Portland, was burned to death by a fire of unknown origin.

WHITE SALMON

A. Ward and wife have taken charge of the Washington hotel, re-opening for business the first of the week. E. Couper, formerly of the Cafe restaurant, is cook.

The McFarland Memorial Presbyterian church, the expense of which was borne by Mrs. McFarland, has been completed and pews placed. This church will be dedicated by Rev. Tate and Rev. Grimes Sunday, Sept. 22, at 11 o'clock.

T. Wyers has contracted for the construction of three 2-ton auto trucks in White Salmon. The machines will be used in his livery and freight business. He believes that these lighter trucks will be found practical for his work and will displace a number of horses.

Lloyd Knight has been at Trout Lake for some time surveying and sub-dividing about 900 acres of J. E. Reynolds' land for orchard purposes. He is also running levels to partially drain Trout Lake for the purpose of bringing it under cultivation. This calls for some skilled engineering. The estimated cost of drainage of the lake is \$3000.

R. Field reports that he has made land deals the past three months representing an aggregate of \$40,000. A tract of 517 acres 15 miles northeast of this place was traded to three families in Colorado for Grand Valley town property, the trade valuation being \$30,000. The families from Colorado are people of means and are expected here about the 20th of the month.

STRAW VOTE FAVORS COUNTY DIVISION

The straw vote on the matter of Klickitat county division in the territory to be laid off resulted overwhelmingly in favor of division last week at the regular state election, 1912 for and 223 against.

This does not end county division however. Division is done by the legislature, and the same work will have to be done in that body that was done in the last legislature when the bill was passed through the senate but killed in the house, largely through the efforts of Representative Hornbrook.

Charles Spencer of White Salmon polled a larger majority against Hornbrook than was anticipated. To several his election is a surprise as it has been considered well nigh impossible to elect a west end man over a candidate from the central part. His total vote is 1102, giving him a majority of 239 over Hornbrook.

To the Fruit Growers: Inquiry is frequently made relative to the securing of literature published by our State Experiment Station and the United States Department of Agriculture. The following information will answer the inquiries:

The publications of the State Experiment Station may be had by all residents of the state on application to the director. Permanent mailing lists are kept of all persons desiring the bulletins as they appear from time to time. Send your applications for bulletins or request to have your name placed upon the mailing list to Dr. James Withycombe, Director Experiment Station, Corvallis, Ore.

The United States Department of Agriculture publishes an immense amount of information, much of which is valuable to the fruit grower. In order that the public may keep track of the publications as they appear from time to time a circular known as the "Monthly List of Publications" is mailed regularly to all who apply for it. Every person who is interested in keeping in close touch with the rapid advances being made along agricultural lines should receive this circular. Names and addresses of parties are placed upon the mailing list on application to the Editor and Chief, Division of Publications, United States Department of Agriculture, Washington, D. C.

The publications of the state experiment stations can only be had by writing to the directors of the stations.
