**H**OWEVER rightly and intelligently women may vote, we cannot now nor will we ever accomplish practical good for the people until we CEASE TO USE THE FRANCHISE IN PART ONLY—that is, the election of office of men who we believe will bring about legislation ameliorating existing conditions is but a step.  
We must not only elect men to office, but we must give those men laws by which they can BETTER CONDITIONS.

The executive for whom I voted could assist me if an unsympathetic legislature would not make laws prohibiting child labor.  
I believe that more good will result from women's CO-OPERATION WITH PRACTICAL MEN IN POLITICS than by their antagonism to these men—antagonism engendered by the mere desire of the franchise.  
I BELIEVE THAT A SYSTEM BY WHICH THE WOMEN CO-OPERATE WITH THE MEN IS A SOLUTION OF THE SUFFRAGE PROBLEM.
