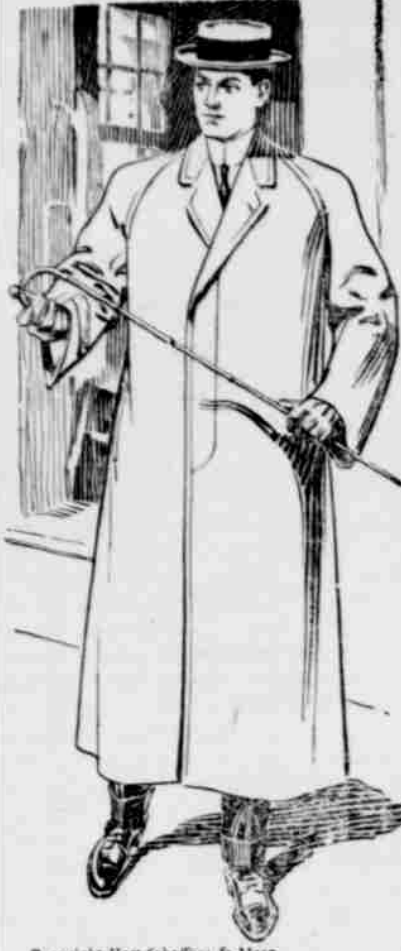

Free Speech By Foul Mouths

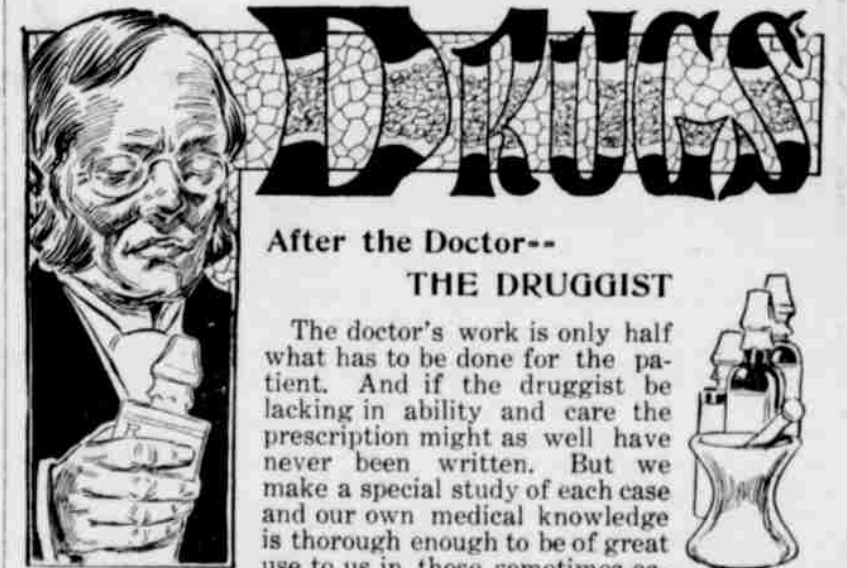
