CAN SHIP FRUIT BY PARCELS POST

Fruit is included among the articles which it will be possible to send through the mails by parcels post when the latter goes into effect the first of next month. In common with other articles likely quickly to decay, it can be sent only for short distances, however, and must be securely packed.

Other articles which may be sent through the mails include the following:

Butter, lard, fish, fresh meats, dressed fowls, vegetables and berries. Eggs will be accepted for local delivery when packed properly in a container and for any distance when each egg is separately packed in a perfectly secure manner.

No restriction is placed on the mailing of glass, dried, smoked or cured meats, but fresh meat will be transported only within the first zone.

Fragile articles, including millinery, toys, musical instruments and articles of glass in whole or in part must be marked "fragile."

Articles that may not be sent by parcels post include intoxicating liquors of any kind or poisons, poisonous animals, insects or reptiles, explosives of every kind, inflammable articles, including matches, infernal machines, pistols or revolvers, disease germs, any obscene, defamatory or scurrilous matter now prohibited by law, live or dead animals or birds or live poultry, raw hides or pelts or anything having a bad odor.

In designing the new stamps the fruit industry has been recognized and an orchard scene will appear on the dollar stamps. The stamps are being sent out by the government now and the local postoffice will have a full supply of them by the first of the year.

BUYS BIG RANCH ON CAMAS PRAIRIE

RECOMMENDS OIL SPRAY FOR SCALE

The recently announced theory of A. L. Melander of Walla Walla that spraying for San Jose scale merely develops a race of "bugs" that are spray immune is given considerable credence by C. L. Whitney, district fruit inspector. Melander, who was formerly with the state college at Pullman, asserted that the survivors propagated other hardy pests and at last the spray would be ineffective. When that time came, he advised the use of some other formula, until that developed the unkillable "bugs," and then switching back.

"It is certain that the lime-sulphur solution which we have been using for years is not doing the work that it once did," said Mr. Whitney. "In Walla Walla county last season we used an oil spray extensively with excellent results."

"In one test I sprayed with lime-sulphur and then on another tree used the oil. Examination under a powerful microscope showed that 75 per cent of the lime-sulphur-sprayed scales were killed, while of those sprayed with oil 97 per cent were dead. The lime-sulphur solution has a caustic effect and burns, while the oil penetrates the bodies of the scale and causes death."

At a recent meeting of the fruit inspectors, Mr. Whitney says he was told that many other inspectors were recommending the use of the oil spray for next year.
