Senator Jones, of Washington, Republican, who previously had determined to vote against public hearings, announced just before the rollcall that he had changed his mind because the finance subcommittees were giving private hearings to some interests which he thought should be public.

Committees to Stand Pat.

Democrats of the committee have practically decided they will propose no changes in the free wool and sugar schedules and that Democrats opposed to the present schedules must carry their fight to the party caucus. According to the present plan the subcommittee having the wool and sugar schedules under consideration will listen to all arguments senators wish to lay before them, but will report the bill to the full Democratic membership of the committee without recommendations. The Democrats of the committee will refer sugar and wool to a party caucus and the senators interested will have an opportunity to make a final appeal.

President Wilson came out strongly as the champion of free wool and free sugar-in-three-years, as provided for in the tariff bill recently passed by the house.

He announced emphatically that he was not considering compromises of any sort; that he stood squarely behind the measure as it passed the house and he regarded it as the duty of the Democratic majority in the senin to fullid its platform pledge by enacting the house bill into law.


