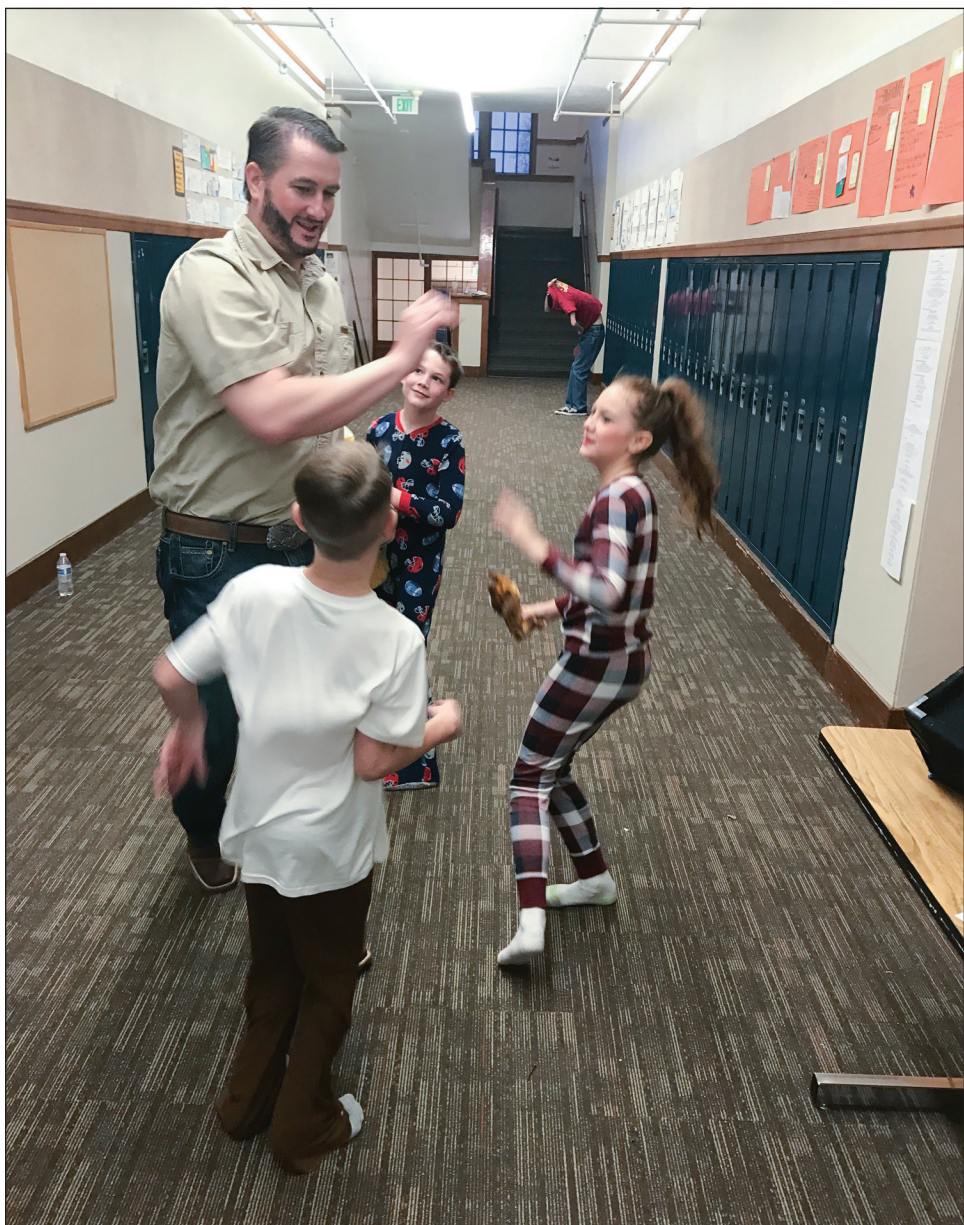
**OCTOBER:** Wind turns Jackson Park banner into an accordion. Public Works crews change the sign throughout the year.
