NEWS OF THE RACE THROUGHOUT THE LAND.

There is only one Negro on the Republican National ticket—Hon. Judson W. Lyons. The passing of Jim Hill, it is said, was due wholly to his own folly. It hurt nobody but himself—not even Mark Hanna.

At the colored men's interstate fruit convention at Kansas City, on the 30th of next month, prominent Negro orators will speak. Among them are such notables as Major Wm. Warner, of Kansas City, Prof. W. R. Vernon, principal of the Western University of Quindaro, Kas., and Rev. W. L. Grant, of Topeka.

The waiters of Washington, D. C., have commenced the publication of a three-column four-page weekly called the Waiters Advocate. The staff is as follows: Ira Ashe, editor, E. Pratt, corresponding editor, J. B. Johnson, business manager, J. W. Williams, treasurer, and J. B. Penn, agent.

The colored leaders of Virginia have organized to fight the constitutional convention which will convene in that state. Albert M. Thomas, of Buffalo, N. Y., a prominent colored lawyer and former Republican, has been elected a member of the Democratic club, and will stump the state for Bryan and Stevenson and the Democratic state ticket.

Waiters should never express their political sentiments too strongly to the guest, as they are not aware of what political faith the guest at his table may be. Of course it is not presumed that waiters will talk politics to guests unless said guests spring the subject.

When the colored waiters realize that in union there is strength they will see the necessity of forming professional organizations and reading colored journals.

Steve Gibson still retains his position as chief cook at the Lawlor Hotel, Houston, Texas.

Hon. Jas. Hill, of Mississippi, has been elected chairman of the Republican committee of that state.

If Negro society would take off its store clothes and paste diamonds, break up its euche clubs and get down to the business of improving the condition of the submerged half of black humanity in the alleys and back streets of our big cities, it would come nearer doing God's service, says a writer in the Colored American. If the white catfish aristocracy would perform a like service among the lower strata of their own race throughout the country and quit their blamed nonsense in trying to follow after people, any six of whom could buy for cash the whole outfit of white catfish aristocrats, human happiness would take a turn for the better and crimes would be greatly diminished in the land.

A race war was precipitated in a big Chicago hotel, the other day, between the white and colored employees, in which the white chef attempted, with all the help he could summon to beat James Meadows into a hospital. The two divided forces went at it. When the engagement was over, the kitchen was a complete wreck, but the colored forces were victorious and had full possession of the premises. We regret such occurrences, but are glad to know that the colored boys won, after being forced into a needless battle.

The District Afro-American Council, of Washington, D. C., is setting a good example in the aggressive manner in which it proceeds to provide such measures and means of self-help and self-protection as the needs of the hour suggests. This council should have a counterpart in every big community in the land. Such work helps the race in the eyes of the world.

While the southern end of the Democratic party is doing everything in its power to disfranchise the Negro, the northern end smilingly asks for his ballot. This simply goes to show that the Negro must trim his sails to catch the breeze as it flies, consulting locality and its prevailing sentiment in shaping his political action. Like unto the tariff, politics is a local question, and all decisions must be governed by common sense and the needs of the situation.
