HOW TO PRONOUNCE THEM.

Names of Cities that Are Various Sounded by the Public. The suggestion has been made that the proper pronunciation of the name St. Louis should be finally determined before the opening of the Louisiana purchase fair in that city, and it is urged the council of St. Louis or even the Legislature of Missouri should pass upon the question. It is pointed out that an immemorial dispute over the proper pronunciation of Arkansas was settled by the Legislature of that State in 1881, when it was enacted that the pronunciation should be "Arkansaw," and the State lived happily ever after. The name St. Louis was bestowed by the French when the place was settled, and the French pronunciation is "Loo-ee, to rhyme with the name of Admiral Dewey. The English pronunciation is "Lewis," practically rhyming with the word Jewess. The suggestion, once made, does not, of course, halt lamely at St. Louis. When the dispute is settled there it is proposed to ask Kentucky to declare whether the name of that Commonwealth's chief city shall be Loo-eyville or Lew-is-ville. And Illinois might settle the point whether the name of the thriving city of Joliet shall be pronounced as the French explorer after whom it was named did—Zho-lee-ya—or whether it shall be called Jolly-yet. All this is exceedingly stimulating to the mind which keeps reaching out for wider fields, like the mind of a man afflicted with the habit of indiscriminate punning. There are plenty of other towns which need attention. The name of the city of Benoufort, in France, is pronounced Bow-for. A town in North Carolina, named after it, is known as Bowfort, while one in South Carolina is called Bu-fert. A noted French seaport, Calais, is pronounced Kal-lay, while its namesake up in Maine is called Kal-lis.

The Richest Baby. The prospective heiress to the greatest fortune in the world—a tiny, blue-eyed, blonde-haired baby with a grandfather worth \$110,000,000 (a father whose worldly goods are estimated at over \$50,000,000, a great-uncle rated at over \$300,000,000 and another grandfather with a modest fortune of about \$15,000,000—lies blissfully unconscious at Ardsley-on-the-Hudson. Her \$50,000,000 father is Percy Avery Rockefeller.

Her \$110,000,000 grandfather is William Rockefeller, the Standard Oil magnate. Her \$15,000,000 maternal grandfather is James Stillman, president of the City National Bank. Her \$300,000,000 great-uncle is John D. Rockefeller, the richest man in the world. What the tiny lady, who is Miss Isabelle Rockefeller, will be worth when she comes of age, no one will dare estimate, for the fortunes of her father and her grandfathers are increasing daily at an almost incredible rate.

It Was a Monkey. I was invited, along with other Europeans on the beach, to one of the biggest plays that have been seen in Opofo. At the feast all kinds of fish, fowl and soup, cooked after the native fashion, were served. Every one thoroughly enjoyed the feast until, near to the finish, the chaser (dessert) was brought in. This dish they called palm oil chop. While it was being served there rolled out of the vessel what to all appearance was a human skull. Suddenly all the Europeans turned pale, as though suffering from an attack of seasickness, and the symptoms they developed were identical, for that dinner would not stay down.
