NEW REPUBLICAN STATES.

The New Age congratulates the Re publicans of the Pacific Northwest on the acquisition to the party of Idaho, Montana and Colorado. Making this coast solidly Republican. The indica tions have been, as stated in former issues of this paper, that Idaho would certainly come over, after several years' wandering after false political gods, to the safe, sure, solid and "grand old party," but it was scarcely expected that Montana, dominated by multi-millionaires who professed to be Democratic, would follow suit. The quarrels of the professedly Democratic millionaires contributed, however, to the result. After Marcus Daly's death Clark had everything his own way for a time, but lately he has been antagonized not only in business but in politics by another reputed millionaire and high-roller, formerly a Republican, Mr. Heinze, whose name indicates his race and religion. Heinze concluded he could do Clark more harm by breaking into Clark's party than he could as a Republican, and the consequence is that while Heinze has won a partial, personal victory in the election of a judge, he has nelped materially to make Montana a Republican state. In order to carry his main point, and elect a judge who it is popularly supposed will favor him in his decisions on the bench-though this should not be assumed too readily-the Democratic candidate for congress, and other Democratic candidates, were sacrificed. But Heinze has over-done his stunt, for Montana will almost surely go Republican hereafter, and If he tries to sneak back into that party he will be kicked out as a man unfit for honest Republicans to assoclate with.

Washington rolled up a big majority, almost as much as it did for McKinley in 1900, for the Republican candidates for convress, and elected 119 out of 136 members of the legislature, thus insuring the election of a Republican senator in the place of Senator Turner, California, though losing two congressmen who ought to have been re-elected, and electing a governor by only a small majority, still showed that it is solidly Republican on national issues. Even Coloother surprise, and if there is any defection now in the Pacific coast it may turn out in Nevada, which contains but a handful of voters. Considering the national elections of 1990 and 1896, the Republicans have gained three states, Colorado, Montana and Idaho, Washington having rejected Bryan Democracy two years ago.

THE GENERAL ELECTIONS.

The country, except of course the Solid South, where Republicans are disfranchised, went very heavily Republican this week, and while the Democrats made some gains in congressmen they were not sufficient or of a nature to be at all discouraging to the Republican party. Its majority in the next House will not be so lorge as in the present one, but it will be quite sufficient, a good "working majority," which after all is better than too large a majority. The fight was close in New York, Mr. Coler receiving a tremendous majority in New York City, but the Republican majorities in the rest of the state were sufficient to do him up. The other Republican states gave very large majorities for an off year. thus giving the administration of President Roosevelt an emphatic endorsement. In fact, the general admiration for the President was the controlling factor in the elections, for not only almost all Republicans but most independents and even many Democrats desired to show their approbation and appreciation of the President. There is no doubt that if earnestness I could summon. he had been running for President he the Republicans did carry by even able to grasp.-Detroit Journal.
