right, and that majorities will soon abrogate prohibitory laws in the States, which now have them ! why then should we try to ennet a law which the people will neither observe nor retain 1. Do political men and legislators say more against prohibition than some of its friends do ! No ; for they quietly and with much sang froid say, wif the people want such a law, we will be ready to enact it." We work for the people, but they have expressed no such want, and we do not believe they wish the law, why then bring the vexed question into the election ! "We repeat our full conviction," says a stausch prohibitionist, that the liquor traffic will ultimately be interdicted by law .- law that shall violate no man's just rights, under the constitution or otherwise. We may not be prepared for it now-we probably are not. Here then is the quietus put upon all direct action upon the question. Do not try to elect a man to the legislature on this as one of his avowed principles, says the rumsellers; for it is neither right nor possible ? Do not bring the question into our ranks, echo party politicians, for the people are not prepared to vote upon it : confusion and trouble and even injury to the good cause will be the consequence. Keep it "out of all parties and party issues," re-echoo's our Triend prohibitionist, for the "people are not prepared for it now."

The common judgment will class these three objectors together. Their positions, though apparently opposite are in reality one, as the forces of an army in battle array, occupying different positions, are yet acting together. Since some prominent temperance men have taken this position. to be inactive the natural enemies of the cause have been remarkably quiet. Having won a temperance party to their own opinion on the subject of voting, they wisely withdraw from the contest, for the present, and leave one class of prohibitionists to oppose the other. Civil strife, they think, will do more to ruin a people than a foreign war. Happily, Clackamas county is of confusion, but we pity Marion county. Yours, A ...

Palmer where he is not personally known ; Therefore, Resolved, That having known Gen. Palmer intimately for many years we have no hesitation in expressing our entire confi-dence in his housety, integrity, and frank sincerity; and that we regard the aspersions cast upon his hitherto untarnished fame as a most gross and unprovoked outrage, and meriting our unqualified reprehension. 2.
