> THE LOSSES BY THE EUROPEAN WAR. The official statement of the losses sustained by the French army, during the late war with Russia, makes the whole number amount to 62,500; though it is suspected that this is very much below the true mark. The English losses are said to be 22,000, and the Sardinian 2,600 - the whole loss of the three nations being thus 87.000 men in a war of less than two years. The Russian and Turkish losses are not announced; but Turkey must have lost 100,000 men, and Russia probably twice as many, as they were fighting desperately the year before the Western allies went into the war. It is safe to estimate the loss of human life, by battle and disease, during the whole peri od of the war, at about 400,000 men.
