

The California papers give accounts of the defeat of Gen. Henry A. Crabb and some eighty-nine Californians who accompanied him to Sonora. Crabb and his associates surrendered after eight days fighting, and fifty-eight—all that were left—were massacred in cold blood. Gen. Crabb's party, it is said, was made up of some of the most respectable and reliable men of California. Gen. Crabb went to Sonora on the invitation of Gen. Gandara, the leader of a faction, and who represented to Crabb that the people of Sonora were ready to declare their independence, and then to seek annexation to the United States. The killing, it is said, was an act of perfidy, and is deeply deplored by the California papers.

The Memphis Eagle & Enquirer says it is informed by a slaveholder of Tishomingo county, Mississippi, that there are many persons in that county who are avowed anti-slavery men; and that some of them are in the habit of declaring they are for a dissolution of the Union, "for the simple reason that such a catastrophe will necessarily result in the abolition of that institution."

Louisiana has passed the following law: "Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the State of Louisiana in general assembly convened, That from and after the passage of this act, no slave shall be emancipated in this State. Approved March 6, 1857."

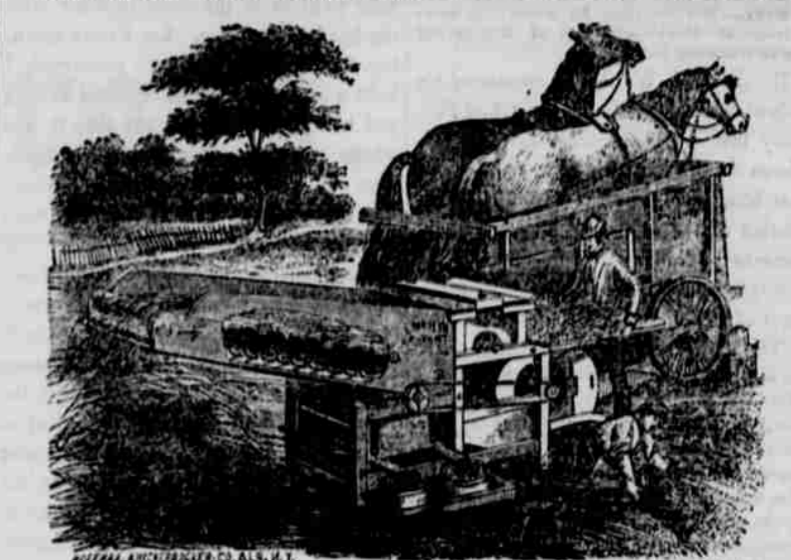
