EDUCATION IN THE UNITED STATES .-At a late meeting of the Connecticut Ills torical Society, Hon, Henry Barnard, the President, presented an interesting paper relating to the amount of donations, bequests, &c., made for educational, literary, and scientific purposes in the United States. The whole amount of land appropriated by the General Government for educational purposes, to the 1st of January, 1854, was stated to be 52,070,221 neres, which, at the minimum price of such lands when first brought into market, represented the magnificent sum of 900,000,000, which, at this time, could not be worth less than \$200,000,000. The amount of donations and subscriptions by individuals for exereds all that had been given by State Legislatures. Mr. Barnard read from a table exhibiting the donations and bequests made by chigens of Boston within the last half century, amounting to upwards of 84,000,000.

DRATH OF THE " MAID OF SARAGOSSA." -The Madrid journals announce the death, at Cueta, of Augustina Zaragoza, who, when very young, distinguished herself greatly in the memorable siege of Saragossa, by assisting the artillerymen in the very thickest of the fight in firing on the French. For her services on this occasion she was made a sub ligutenant of infantry in the Spanish army, and received several decorations. She was buried at Cueta with all the honors due to her memory.

How Fast they Digo.-The eminent Dr. Baudens, in an able report on his official mission to the Crimea, affirms that, for some time, two hundred French soldiers expired daily between that region and Constantinople, and that the official bulletins conveyed no adequate idea of the sufferings and privations of the troops, and the extent and horrors of the mortality. "If we consult," he says, "the medical statistics of the hospital establishments, three thousand two hundred and fifeen the number of deaths recorded in the hospitals was about sixty-three thousand; thirty one thousand in the Crimea, and thirty-two thousand at Constantinople,"-Was another campaign possible?

65 The Commissioner of Patents has set apart a portion of the funds last appropriated by Congress for agricultural purposes for obtaining cuttings of all the native wild grape vines of the United States, to be placed in the hamls of practical cultivators, with a view of testing their adaptation to the soil and climate of the other sections of the Union, and determining their value for table use and for making wine.

The description of symptoms might be extended infinitely, taking in all the propensities and obliquities of mental and moral condition. The tongue is a most expressive as well as unruly member .- Scientific American.

Comming was at one time an extensive merchant in Augus. te, Ga., but failed. Removing to St. Louis, he established himself as sutler to the forces stationed at Jefferson Barracks, and was subsequently appointed Indian Agent, the duties of which he discharged with great discretion and judgment .- Bultimore

23 It is estimated that about 25,000 ales of rags, averaging 275 lbs. each, are every year received at New York from Europe. A very large portion come from Glasgow, Scotland, and Leghorn, Italy. He stated that Bunker Hill Monument is higher in the evening than in the morning of a sunny day; the little sunbeams enter the pores of the stones like so many wedges, lifting up.
