**WILAMET RIVER, Oct. 8th.**

**Mr. ARDEN**—The *St. Lawrence* held the "Eik" mad her first trip yesterday to Champeo, and returned to day. She full ran up to her most sanguine expectations in speed &c., having made the best "triple time" that was ever made on the upper Wilamet. She had the run from Canama to Champeo in 131 minutes, only 5 minutes more than the *Enterprise's* best time. She is bit express for the Butvil, Champeo and Yamhill trail. She is 95 ft. long, 17 1/2 ft. wid, stern level, and propelled by a pair of engines each 10 inches bore by 4 ft. stroke, turning a 16 ft. wheel. She is kalkulated to carry 50 or 60 tons. Her hull was built by Mr. Lambert and Mr. McCourt, cabin by Sweitzer (part owner) and masted by Mr. Marshall (part owner). The major part is on in Butvil, Champeo and the French prairie. C. E. Sweitzer, an experienced river steam-boiler man, will in all probability be chosen for her captain and pilot, and Mr. Marshall the Engineer, who is also competent in her line.
