

If nobler sentiments than the following, uttered by Daniel Webster, ever fell from human lips, we have yet to see them. They are, indeed, pearls of the rarest value, and should be cherished in the heart of every one:

"It is only the shallow-minded pretenders who make either distinguished origin a matter of personal merit, or obscure origin a matter of personal reproach. A man who is not ashamed of himself, need not be ashamed of his early condition. It did happen to me to be born in a log cabin, raised among the snow-drifts of New Hampshire, at a period so early that when the smoke first rose from its rude chimney, and curled over the frozen hills, there was no similar evidence of a white man's habitation between it and the settlements on the rivers of Canada. Its remains still exist: I make it an annual visit. I carry my children to it, to teach them the hardships endured by the generation before them. I love to dwell on the tender recollections, the kindred ties, the early affections, and the narrations and incidents, which mingle with all I know of this primitive family abode; I weep to think that none of those who inhabited it are now among the living; and if ever I fail in affectionate veneration for him who raised it, and defended it against savage violence and destruction, cherished all domestic comforts beneath its roof, and, through the fire and blood of seven years' revolutionary war, shrunk from no toil, no sacrifice, to serve his country, and to raise his children to a condition better than his own, may my name and the name of my posterity be blotted from the memory of mankind."

THE CAPITOL EXTENSION.—It has been reported that the new hall of the House of Representatives and the Senate Chamber will be ready for occupancy by the next session of Congress. The Washington Union, however, says that it is not intended to occupy them during the coming session, nor until that of 1858 and 1859, when it is expected that the extensions will be completely finished throughout, and the old halls appropriated to other purposes.

Some idea of the magnificent scale of the extension of the Capitol may be gathered from the following items given in the Union:—

The windows of the north and south fronts cost \$1659 each. The marble workmanship on each of the eastern front doorways, \$4075. The two figures of statuary to be placed over each door are estimated at \$9230. The doors, bronze, and bearing bas-relief designs illustrative of American history, will cost \$13,200 for each wing. They are designed by Crawford. It is the intention to have one executed at Munich, and the other, for the promotion of American art, in this country. The door opening from the old hall of the House of Representatives into the corridor leading to the new hall, will also be of bronze, bearing bas-relief designs illustrative of American history, and will, it is estimated, cost \$14,416—designed by Randolph Rogers. The statuary intended for the eastern pediment of the north wing of the Capitol, designed and modeled by Mr. Crawford, it is estimated will cost \$40,260. For the design and model of the Statue of Liberty, intended to surmount the new dome of the Capitol, Mr. Crawford is to receive \$3000, for the Indian Girl \$120, and for the mantel-piece for the Senate reception room, \$500.

AN EXTRAORDINARY SURGICAL TRIUMPH.—The Lowell News says that some twenty-seven months ago a young man named Wm. K. Foster had the whole of one elbow joint torn out by an accident. He was taken to the hospital, where Dr. Kimball, advised by Drs. Graves and Dickey, proceeded to saw off the fragmentary bones, shortening them some two and a half inches, and then uniting them so as to make a new joint. Strange as it may seem, the wound did well and healed, and Mr. Foster has a good elbow joint and arm. He moves the joint with perfect ease, though not quite so fully as the other, and can, as he says, hold twenty-two and a half pounds with the hand at arm's length. The arm is now nearly three and a half inches shorter than the other, and is a good and reliable arm for all the purposes of labor to which Mr. Foster is called.

The Swell-Head Disease.—This dreadful disease sometimes attacks horses, and, probably, other animals, as monkeys and jackasses; and some birds, as the parrot and mocking-bird. But men are more subject to it, and with them it is more fatal.

CAUSE.—Vacuity in the cranium. It is often augmented by flatulency, especially when the cerebrum is small and ill shaped. The preponderance is called self-esteem.

He is egotistic and passionately fond of high-sounding titles, as "Squire, Captain, Colonel, General, &c." The miserable patient is sometimes so inflated as to attempt to stride the ocean, or jump over very high mountains. These are only a few of the symptoms of this malady, but enough to identify it.

TREATMENT.—When it is caused by emptiness of the cranium, it is only necessary to fill up the vacuum with good ideas, a solid education or common sense. When induced by diminutiveness, or malformation of the brain, the cure is slow and difficult. We have known some cases which defied every remedy and destroyed the patient. A cure must be at-

tempted by exercising and cultivating those faculties which are deficient, such as the judgment and the understanding, and depicting self-esteem, &c. The skulls of these patients are usually very thick and hard, so that it is hard pounding anything into them, but they are excessively fond of soft soap—give them a pound or two every day, and it will soften the skull so that you can probably get a little gumption into it, or a modicum of reason, and they will soon be well. When this will not cure, soft soap will palliate.

In the case of those gentlemen, from ten to twenty years old, who get to putting on the boots and pantaloons of their fathers, and to teaching their teachers, reproving, counseling, and sometimes insulting old age, chewing tobacco, smoking cigars and drinking whisky—swearing and cutting the dandy swell-head generally—appetite for late hours, bad company and bar-rooms voracious—a little oil of birch applied by the paternal hand is the best remedy. Then keep them out of the night air and bad weather. If this does not effect a cure by the divine blessing—the head grows and grows, till the poor sufferer topples over a few times, and knocks out half of his self-esteem.—*Louisiana Baptist.*

GRASSHOPPER MIGRATION.—A Minnesota correspondent of a Chicago paper expresses the conviction that the grasshoppers that have been ravaging portions of Minnesota, will reach the Atlantic States before their destructive mission is ended. This opinion has been elicited in reply to the one expressed that the grasshopper plague was peculiar or incidental to Utah and Minnesota. The writer is in possession of facts which show that these grasshoppers migrate from the Pacific shore.—*He says:*

"Nothing but the interposition of Divine Providence will prevent the annual devastation of these insects in every State east of this to the Atlantic coast, which they may not reach under three years; having been about that time since they left Utah and the Upper Minnesota Valley.—Already I hear that one wing of the great army has reached Wisconsin, the right wing having reached Iowa, and the central column the edge of Illinois. It is to be feared their eggs will be deposited in these States."

"The section of country where they have been destructive in Minnesota for two years is narrow—a strip on each side of the Mississippi, above St. Anthony's Falls. The insect did not reach quite down to St. Anthony. The eastern and southern sections of Minnesota escaped until their flight east and south."

DELAWARE AS A SLAVE STATE.—The New York Independent has investigated the history and statistics of slavery in Delaware. It is found that the percentage of slaves in the population of that State, not half that of the other Southern States at any period, has steadily diminished at every census, from 15 per cent. in 1790, to two and a half per cent. in 1850. The whole number of slaveholders in the State is now only five hundred, and of these only twenty possess from ten to twenty slaves, and a hundred and seventy-two have less than five!
