

GENERAL WASHINGTON A MARSHAL OF FRANCE.—The Frederick (Md.) Examiner says that some weeks ago a gentleman of the city remarked that he had in his possession an old porcelain mug, with an effigy of Gen. Washington on horseback, and the inscription beneath, "George Washington, Esq., General-in-Chief of the United States Army and Marshal of France." A discussion thereupon arose as to whether Washington had ever received the baton of a Marshal of France. To resolve the doubt, Col. A. Kimmel said he would address the venerable G. W. Parks Custis, the surviving member of Washington's household, on the subject. He did so, and received in reply the following letter, which was handed in for publication, on account of the important historical fact to which it refers. Mr. Custis's letter is dated:

ARLINGTON HOUSE,
Thursday, August 18, 1857.
My DEAR COL. KIMMEL: Your very acceptable letter came duly to hand. In regard to Washington as Marshal of France, I have in this house a proof as strong as holy writ, in an engraving of Napoleon at Microstoun, the celebrated inventor of the Logarithms, which was presented to Washington by the Earl of Buchan, a relative of the philosopher, with this indorsement in the handwriting of the Earl: "To Marshal General Washington, with the respects of Buchan." Now, Buchan lived in the age of the Revolution, and was the associate of Courts, and certainly would not have addressed to one he so loved and admired, as he did to the Chief, a title to which the Chief had no claim. Lord Napier, on a visit to Arlington House, was greatly gratified by a sight of a reminiscence of his ancestors treasured among the relics of Washington.

The history of the American, a Marshal of France, is simply this: When in 1781 Colonel Laurens went to France as special ambassador, a difficulty arose between him and the French Ministry as to the command of the combined armies in America. Our heroic Laurens said: "Our chief must command; it is our cause, and the battle is on our own soil." "C'est impossible," exclaimed the Frenchman; by the etiquette of the French service, the Count de Rochambeau, being an old Lieutenant-General, can only be commanded by the King in person, or a *Mareschal de France*. "Then," exclaimed Laurens, "make our Washington a *Mareschal de France*, and the difficulty is at an end." It was done. A friend of mine heard Washington spoken of as *Monsieur le Mareschal* at the siege of Yorktown. Our beloved Washington never coveted or desired rank or title; but it is beyond a doubt that, from the force of circumstances just related, the rank and title of *Mareschal de France* were conferred upon the General-in-Chief of the combined armies of America and France. THE CAMELS.—An interesting report has been received by the war department from Beale, superintendent of the wagon road expedition from Fort Defiance. The camel experiment is pronounced successful. These animals carried seven hundred pounds burthen, principally provender for mules. They eat but little except bushes, preferring them to grass. Mr. B. conceives it easier to manage a train of twenty camels than one of five mules. Their temper, tractability, capacity for bearing burthens and going without water, while they live upon food upon which other animals would starve, render them valuable for transportation on the prairies. Every unshod animal reached El Paso lame but the camels, not one of which ever exhibited fatigue.

AN IMMENSE SPECULATION.—The amount realized by the Illinois Central Rail Road Company from the sales of their lands, up to this time, is said to be upwards of thirteen million of dollars, and yet their grant is not half sold. The quantity remaining unsold, we learn, is one million four hundred and fifty thousand acres. This will, it is thought, readily command sixteen dollars per acre, on an average, or twenty-three million two hundred thousand dollars for the whole. Add the sum realized, and we have a total of upwards of thirty-six million of dollars. The company then have a road free of cost and upwards of fifteen millions of dollars besides. If this isn't a gigantic speculation, it is simply an almost unrestricted present from the State of Illinois to a rich company of Eastern capitalists.—*Mound City Emporium*.

Commodore Paulding, who has been engaged in the exploration of the Isthmus between Aspinwall and Panama, to ascertain the practicability of constructing a ship canal between the Atlantic and Pacific oceans, has reported to the Navy Department that no serious obstacle exists, but that the great difficulty would be to procure laborers. The length of the proposed route is 403 miles, and it is estimated that the cost will not exceed \$80,000,000.—*Forney's Press*.

The following recipe is found floating about our exchanges, headed—"A recipe worth one thousand dollars." If this is so, we are happy to print it:

Take one pound of soap, half a pound unslacked lime—put it in a gallon of water and boil twenty minutes. Let it stand till cool; drain off and put in a stone jug or jar. Soak your clothes over night, or let it well wet through, then wring them out and rub on plenty of soap; and in one boiler of soap well covered with water, add one teaspoonful washing fluid. Boil half an hour briskly—then wash thoroughly through one suds and rinse with water, and your clothes will look better than by the old way of washing twice before boiling. The woman who can keep a secret (her name is suppressed) it is stated has known this a year or two, but it has finally leaked out.—*Utica Herald*.

NOVEL THEORY IN NATURAL SCIENCE.—A writer in one of the scientific monthlies contends that the two great kingdoms in nature, the animal and vegetable, have one common origin—the organic cell—the distinction between the two kingdoms every day disappearing, most of the organic products which were thought to distinguish the animal from the vegetable having been found in both; and motion even no longer separates the animal from the vegetable world. This property of matter appears to be most incessantly occupied in the minutest organisms—the motion of the minute cilia of vegetables, the contraction of the leaves of the sensitive plant, &c., being familiar instances. The only distinction between the lowest orders of the two kingdoms, the Protia and Alga, is that the former possess to a certain extent voluntary motion. In the vegetable kingdom the rudiment of nervous apparatus, or a cell generating nervous force has not been discovered, although there are evidences of the existence of a force requiring the same conditions, viz: heat, moisture, oxygen, and a germ. In the lowest form of animals, the rudiments of a nervous cell cannot be discovered; yet these beings possess the attributes of vitality, and even nervous force. These facts point to the conclusion that nervous force is entirely distinct from the vital. Such a theory indicates certainly an advance upon those which have been commonly entertained, but is hardly likely to supersede them at present.

The interpretation of Caroline is regal; that of Charlotte is a queen; Elizabeth and Eliza signify true; Clara, bright or clear-eyed; Agnes, chaste; Amanda, amiable; Laura, a laurel; Edith, joyous; Olivia, peace; Phoebe, light of life; Grace, favor; Sarah, or Sally, a princess; Sophia, wisdom; Amelia and Amy, beloved; Matilda, a noble maid; Margaret, a pearl; Hannah, Anna, Anne, Ann, and Nancy, all of which are of the same original name, interpreted, mean gracious, or kind. Jane signifies dignity; Ida, the morning star; Lucy, brightness of aspect; Louisa, or Louise, one who protects; Emma, tender; Catherine, pure; Frances, or Fanny, frank or free; Lydia, severe; Minerva, chaste.

DORMANT WEALTH.—The Mexican papers announce that the volcano of Popocatepetl has been discovered to be coated with a solid deposit of pure sulphur to the depth of from one to ten feet. The commerce of sulphur and sulphuric acid with the United States alone will yield at least thirty millions of dollars annually.

THE OVERLAND MAIL.—Five mails have now arrived at San Diego by the overland route from San Antonio, Texas, making their transit in the following time: First, or pioneer mail, fifty-three days; second mail, thirty-eight days; fourth mail, twenty-six days and twelve hours. The company now have a line of coaches on the route, and advertise to ticket passengers through from San Francisco to New Orleans.

PROSPEROUS.—The value of taxable property in Georgia, increased thirty millions of dollars last year! The State tax has in consequence been reduced to eight cents on one hundred dollars, or about one-twelfth of one per cent.

FIGHTING WISKEY.—A very sedate gentleman from the rural districts, passing through one of our warehouses in Market street, was arrested by a large number of barrels of "Red head copper distilled," which obstructed his passage. "How many barrels of whiskey have you in store?" inquired our friend of an *adjuque* of the house, with an air of great interest. "Three thousand," promptly replied the interrogated. "Three thousand barrels," repeated the countryman, speaking very deliberately; "ten figs to the barrel is a low estimate—and how many figs is that?"
