A FEW THINGS WHICH EVERYBODY OUGHT TO KNOW, -A quart of peas, sown in a shallow box, 15 inches wide by 18 long, at any time of the year, and cut when about four or five inches high, and boiled like spinach, with a little salt, makes a most delicious dish.
