Women's Rights,-Much is said and writen now a days of women's rights .-What, then, are her rights ! She has a right to a good education. This it is not only just but expedient to give her. The conversation of an eduested woman is a perpetual feast. If the first pleasure of life is action, the second certainly is talk; and there is often almost as much pleasure in talking about things as in doing thein. No one mind ever saw all sides of all subjects, nor even all sides of one subject; and the wisest suggestions not unfrequently come from the least informed.
