ADULTERATION OF SUGAR.-The New York Journal of Commerce states that the panters of Louisiana have been in the habit for many years of using a small quantity of lime with the cane juice in the making of sugar, but sometimes when too much was added, the loss was greater than the gain, the color being injured instead of improved and the brightness of the sugar destroyed Not long since an ingenious Belgian chemist dis-covered a process by which the light color of the juice is protected from the change ordinarily produced by contact with the atmosphere and also prevented from souring as rapidly as if left in its natural state. The process consists of a slight infusion of sulphate of lime, and its use has greatly improved both the yield and appearence of Louisand sugar, and until recently this gain has been upposed to be without any corresponding disad-antage. Within a few weeks there have been spers of doubts in regard to it, and the com plaints have become quite general among the gro improved, do not keep as well; not only do the change color, but the waste by drainage and evap oration is said to be very greatly enhanced in con-sequence of the new process. Not only this, but the refiners have made the discovery that the su-gars do not crystalize as well, and would not yield as they would formerly to the same weight. The Journal hesitated about giving publicity to these complaints, not knowing how much of it might arise from prejudice, but the result of some recent experiments has satisfied them of its truth, and the importance of the interests involved certainly call investigation. Ordinance No. 35.

To Regulate the Granting of Liquor License, SEC. 1. Be it ordained by the City Council of Oregon City, That it shall not be lawful for any person to sell spirituous or malt liquors within the city limits in less quantities than one quart, with-out first obtaining license therefor in accordance

with the provisions of this ordinance.

SEC. 2. Any person desiring to procure liceuse to sell spirituous liquors, shall give public notice that at the expiration of ten days he will apply to the City Collector therefor. Such notice shall be in writing, and given by posting the same at three of the most public places in the corporate

limits of the city.
Sec. 3. At the expiration of ten days from the time of giving such notice such person shall present to the City Collector a petition signed by a majorny of the legal voters of the city, such majority to be determined as follows: If there be no re oustrance against the granting of such liceuse the names presented upon the petition shall be deemed a majority; but if a remonstrance be pre-sented at the time of presenting such petition, the applicant for license shall procure as aguers to his petition the names of an actual majority or voters the City Collector, within three days after such

application.
SEC. 4. Any applicant for license, who shall comply with the two preceding sections, shall be entitled to receive the same upon paying the City Collector the sum of two hundred dollars per annum, or in the same proportion for a less period; provided that no license shall be granted for a less

SEC. 5. Every person applying for license as aforeasid, before receiving the same, shall execute to the City Council a bond in the penal sum of five hundred dollars, with two or more good sureties, conditioned that he will keep an orderly house; that he will not permit any unlawful gaming or riot-ous conduct in or attent his house; that he will not give, sell, or otherwise dispose of spirituous liquors on the first day of the week commonly called Sunday; and the violation of any of the conditions of such bond shall subject the off-nder to a fine of not less than twenty nor more than one hundred dollars. to be recovered upon complaint before the Mayor or Recorder; and if such person shall the state of the st the Mayor or Recorder; and if such person shall fail to pay any such fine assessed against him, and the costs, he shall be imprisoned one day for ev-ery two dollars thereof until it is discharged; and any volation of the conditions of such bond shall work a foriciture of the license granted to the of-fender, and he shall be debarred from procurity license for an months after conviction of the

offense.
SEC. 6. It is hereby made the special duty of
the City Collector and Marshal to comptain of all
persons violating this ordinance.
SEC 7. The City Collector shall, at each term

of the District Court in the county of Clackamas, return to the Grand Jury thereof, the names of all persons who have obtained license of him since the preceding term of Court, and the time of the exration of any that may have been determ

during the vacation.
