

A NEGRO ACTING AS PASTOR FOR WHITE PEOPLE.—On Lynn Creek, Giles county, Tennessee, there is a Hardshell Baptist church, which for several years past, has had for its pastor a negro named George—known as Bentley's old George—and belonging to one Matthew Bentley. George is said to be a most excellent man and a good preacher. Some time ago he had a noted public discussion lasting four days, with a white preacher, on the subject of Baptism, from which the white man came off second best. The church wants to buy George, but he is unwilling to be sold out of his master's family, and is withal a regular Southern, pro-slavery parson. George is the "preacher in charge" of a large congregation, nearly all of whom are slaveholders, and who pay him a salary of \$600 or \$700 for his pastoral services.

Miss Bates, the sister of the Hon. Edward Bates, of St. Louis, recently emancipated the last of thirty-two slaves, who formed part of her inheritance, and whom she has gradually set free as they became prepared to take care of themselves in freedom. Judge Bates emancipated the last of his slaves several years since.

The foreign journals received by late advices contain numerous paragraphs about the extreme heat of the first half of July. The 6th of that month was reported to be the hottest day ever known in the south of France, the thermometer having attained the extraordinary height of 118 degrees of Fahrenheit's scale.

It is a remarkable fact that no regular Democratic organ can be sustained in Washington City, or in any of the large cities, without Government patronage.—The Constitution, the organ of Buchanan's administration, has less than two thousand subscribers.

The Levant Herald, an English paper published at Constantinople, says:—"We risk nobody's contradiction in affirming that the American missionaries have done more to advance civilization and pure religion throughout Turkey than all the other agencies, diplomatic or missionary, which European policy or propaganda has ever set to work upon the country."

AARON BURR.—A marble shaft recently erected over the remains of Aaron Burr, in the graveyard at Princeton, New Jersey, has been mutilated and broken by some persons unknown. The shaft was erected by stealth, no one knowing who put it there.

THE DOG-STAR.—The largest star seen in the sky is one in the South, called the Dog-Star. From calculations, it is known that its distance from us is not less than nineteen millions of millions of miles. Other stars have been calculated to be forty-two thousand times more distant than this, and light, which travels at the rate of a million of miles in five seconds, must be sixty-three thousand years in traveling from them to the earth.
